THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW

FOREIGN TRADE

The favourable business conditions prevailing in 1954 still influenced the foreign trade of Finland during the first half of the current year. Demand for the principal export articles continued to be satisfactory and the development of prices was favourable. Until quite recently, prices of export goods were tending upwards, while import prices were decreasing to some extent. The proportion between export and import prices (1935 = 100) therefore rose to 131 on an average for the first six months of the year from 118 for the corresponding period in 1954.

The volume of exports for January—June was about 7 per cent larger this year than it was last year. As prices were higher this year, the value of exports grew more than did their volume. Income from exports totalled 72,757 mill. marks, exceeding the corresponding amount for 1954 by 14 per cent.

Of the most important export goods, the following quantities were shipped prior to the end of June.

The quantities delivered amounted to rather less than indicated by the sales figures. This was due to some disturbances in connection with transportation, the most serious elements being the Finnish railway strike in March, a temporary shortage of railway wagons, and the prolonged harbour

strike in the United Kingdom. The late arrival of spring also delayed shipments. The greatest increase in deliveries related to paper (27%), chemical pulp (19%) and sawnwood (16%). Exports of newsprint increased by 8 per cent only, despite the expansion of the productive capacity of the mills. Exports of prefabricated houses decreased by 52 per cent owing to a reduction in USSR purchases to one third of the corresponding quantity in 1954.

The value of *imports* during the first half of this year totalled 82,018 mill. marks, and exceeded the corresponding figure for 1954 by 24 per cent. The volume of imports increased even more.

Imports consisted first and foremost of industrial raw materials, machinery, and foodstuffs. The biggest items were: iron and steel 6,188 mill. marks (4,815 mill. in 1954), machinery and apparatus 6,745 mill. marks (4,740), coal and coke 5,741 million (2,912), and liquid fuel 3,774 million (3,464).

The balance of trade for the first half-year showed an excess of imports of 9,261 mill. marks. In 1954 and 1953 the corresponding deficits were 2,225 and 6,206 mill. marks respectively. It is in fact a normal trait of Finland's foreign trade that the first six months of the year yield a deficit. This is due to the seasonal fluctuations in exports and imports being different. This year's deficit is, however, exceptionally large, its principal cause — apart from the disturbances in transportation — being that, for reasons of monetary policy, imports were allowed to expand more than was the case in the years before. During the second,

half-year exports are normally heavier than imports. And although imports are also expected to increase this year, the trade deficit will probably change into a surplus in the next few months.

FOREIGN PAYMENTS POSITION

During the second quarter of this year, customary decrease in the foreign exchange reserve amounted to 6.600 mill. marks, as compared with only 700 million in 1954. The combined gold and currency reserves of the Bank of Finland and the commercial banks totalled 34.400 million at the end of June, or 4,500 million more than they had done a year earlier. Primarily by reason of a reduction in sterling and DM balances, EPU currencies fell by 7,400 mill. marks to 14,700 million, the decrease during the second quarter exceeding the increase of the first quarter by more than 2,000 mill. marks. Dollar reserves were reduced by 100 mill. marks to 13,400 million, while the net indebtedness in other Western currencies grew by 600 mill, marks to 3,600 million, as the clearing balance with Argentina deteriorated. An increase in the balance with the USSR raised the reserves in Eastern Bloc currencies by 1.500 mill, marks to 9.900 million. The considerable decrease in the net reserve during the second quarter was, however, caused partly by a deliberate expansion of imports at the cost of the reserves, and partly by temporary factors.

This year, the payment of the 2,300 mill. marks in Western currencies by which the USSR balances its trade deficit with Finland was postponed in its entirety to the second half-year, whereas in 1954 half of it was paid in June. And, although the reserves of Western currencies were augmented in April, when 1,200 mill. marks was drawn on the first stand-by credit granted by the USSR in 1954, the increase was outweighed by the purchase by the Bank of Finland of foreign bonds for 1,500 million.

On account of delays in shipments, export receipts during the second quarter were exceptionally low considering the present export conditions. Receipts in Western currencies during April—June were slightly over 27,000 mill. marks, or only 2,000 million more than during April—June 1954. For

January-June they amounted to 60.000 mill, marks, or 24 per cent more than for the first half of 1954. Import payments in Western currencies increased steadily: during the second quarter they were 31,000 mill. marks, or 8,000 million more than during the corresponding quarter of last year, and during January-June 56,000 mill. marks. or 39 per cent more than during the first half of 1954. — Export receipts in Eastern Bloc currencies totalled 14.000 mill. marks during the second quarter, and 24,000 million during January—June, while the corresponding figures for import payments and 23.000 mill. 13.000 respectively: in comparison with the first half of 1954 these export receipts had increased by 11 per cent and import payments by 17 per cent.

The increase in export earnings expected to occur in the second half-year was amply drawn on in licensing during April—June. Import licences were issued for 51,000 mill. marks in all, of which licences in Western currencies amounted to 41,000 million, or nearly 6,000 million more than in the first quarter and very nearly 14,000 million more than in April—June 1954. Thus, licensing in Western currencies approached 77,000 mill. marks for the first half-year, exceeding the corresponding figure for January—June 1954 by 48 per cent, while the corresponding figures for licences in Eastern Bloc currencies were 35,000 mill. marks and 5 per cent.

The value of licences outstanding at the end of June was 74,500 mill. marks and exceeded last year's corresponding amount by 10,400 million. The result is fairly satisfactory from the point of view of the payments position, as, in spite of generous licensing, the stock of licences in Western currencies increased by 8,500 million only, or 2,000 million less than during the first quarter. Moreover, fully 4,000 mill. marks' worth of the licences relate to imports for the payment for which the foreign exchange has been pre-purchased from the Bank of Finland by importers. Thus the licences affecting the payments position actually increased by 4,400 mill. marks only during the second quarter of the current year.























CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND

1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; from 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The legislative power of the country is vested in the Diet and the President. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The President for the current period, March 1, 1950, to March 1, 1956, is Juho Kusti Paasikivi who has been in office since March 11, 1946.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The number of seats of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1954 are as follows: Social Democrats 54, Agrarians 53, People's Democrats 43, Conservatives 24, Swedish Party 13, Finnish People's Party (former Liberal Party) 13.

2. LAND

THE AREA is 337,009 square kilometres (Great Britain's area is 245,000 sq. km and Italy's area 301,000 sq. km). Of the total area 9.4 % are inland waters. On an average 13.9 % of the land in the South of Finland is cultivated (1950), 1.9 % in the North, 8.0 % of the whole land. Of the land area 21.7 mill, ha (53.5 mill, acres) or 70.9 % are covered by forests.

3. POPULATION

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1954): 4.2 millions. Sweden (1954) 7.2, Switzerland (1954) 4.9, Denmark (1953) 4.4 and Norway (1953) 3.4 millions.

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1954): In South Finland 23.5, in North Finland 3.7 and in the whole country an average of 13.8 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

DISTRIBUTION (1954): 66.2 % of the population inhabit the country, 38.8 % the towns and market towns. The largest towns are (1954): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 396,300 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 107,500, Tampere (Tammerfors) 107,600.

OCCUPATION (1950): Agriculture and forestry 42%, industry 29%, commerce 7%, transport and communication 6%, services 9%, other economically active persons 1%, economically inactive persons 6%.

LANGUAGE (1950): Finnish speaking 91.1 %, Swedish speaking 8.6 %, others 0.3 %.

EDUCATION (1953): Practically all persons over 15 years of age are literate. There are three universities (the oldest founded in 1640) and 12 colleges of university standard.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1953): Births 21.9 $^{\circ}/_{00}$, deaths 9.6 $^{\circ}/_{00}$, increase 11.6 $^{\circ}/_{00}$. Deaths in France (1953) 13.0 $^{\circ}/_{00}$ and in Great Britain (1953) 11.4 $^{\circ}/_{00}$.

4. TRADE AND COMMUNICATIONS

NATIONAL INCOME (1953, in thousand million marks): Gross national income at market price 805. Net national product at factor cost, by origin: agriculture 81 (13%), forestry and fishing 61 (10%), manufacturing 195 (32%), construction 60 (10%), transport and communications 41 (7%), commerce, banking and insurance 77 (13%), public activities 59 (10%), other services 34 (5%), total 608. Volume index 122 (1948 = 100).

FOREST RESOURCES (1950): The growing stock comprised 1,370 million of solid cub. m. incl. bark (48,884 million cub. ft), of which pine 45.5 % and spruce 32.2 %, the rest 22.3 % being leaf-trees, chiefly birch. Of the growing stock, 7,471 million cub. ft, 65.0 % of them pines, was up to the standard required for logs (minimum for sawmill logs 18' × 6" and for veneer logs 18' × 7"). The annual growth is about 41 million of solid cub. m. green wood excl. bark (1,448 mill. cub. ft). The

total removal in 1949 calculated according to the use of wood was 40 million cub. m. (1,413 million cub. ft). In the years 1923 to 1938 in the then area of the country, it averaged 41 million cub. m. (1,448 million cub. ft) per year, the corresponding yearly growth being 46 million cub. m. (1,624 million cub. ft).

AGRICULTURE (1950): Cultivated land 2.5 million hectares, divided as follows: area under cultivation under 10 hectares 41.2 %, 10—50 ha 53.6 %, 50—100 ha 3.6 %, over 100 ha 1.6 %. Cultivated land (1958) was divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 43.4 % hay, 7.7 % temporary grassland for grazing, 19.0 % oats, 5.0 % wheat, 3.7 % rye, 6.7 % barley, 3.7 % potatoes, 10.8 % others. Dairy units in operation in 1953 amounted to 459.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND (1950): The land area was distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 56.9 %, State 35.0 %, joint stock companies etc. 6.4 %, communities 1.7 %.

INDUSTRY (1952): Number of industrial concerns 5,994, workpeople 270,453, gross value of products of industry 508,355 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1954): 5,046 km, of which 4,859 km State railways and 187 km private. The gauge is in general 1.524 m.

MERCHANT FLEET (1. 4. 1955): Steamers 319 (422,790 gross reg. tons), motor vessels 149 (294,238 gross reg. tons), sailing vessels with auxiliary engines 120 (11,777 gross reg. tons). Total 588 (728,805 gross reg. tons).

5. FINANCE AND BANKING

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to 1914 the currency maintained its stable gold value, and after the disturbances caused by the war a gold standard was again introduced from January 1, 1926. The unit currency is the mark (Finnish markka) = 100 penniä). Since October 12, 1931, the redemption of bank notes in gold is, however, suspended. In 1948 Finland joined the International Monetary Fund and on June 27, 1951, the official par value of the mark was established at 230 marks per one U. S. dollar, the selling rate of the Bank of Finland being 231 marks and its buying rate 229 marks.

STATE FINANCES. According to the finance accounts for 1954 the State revenue was 215,569 million marks, of which 194,302 million marks were current revenue, and State expenditure 213,663 million marks, of which 143,897 million marks were current expenditure.

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the finance accounts for 1952 expenditure amounted to 98,483 million marks. Total revenue was 100,367 million marks, of which income from taxation was 57,395 million marks. The municipal income tax (non-progressive) averaged 10.9 % of the ratepayers income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head office is in Heisinki (Heisingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vasa), Oulu (Uleåborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Mikkeli (S:t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä, Kotka and Lahti.

THE COMMERCIAL BANKS (1955): Number 6, possess 520 offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. There is one banking establishment per 8,200 inhabitants.

The largest banks are Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Oy Pohjoismaiden Yhdyspankki — Ab Nordiska Föreningsbanken and Helsingin Osakepankki — Helsingfors Aktieoank, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1955): Mortgage Banks 5, Savings banks 421, Co-operative Credit Societies 594 and a Central Bank for the latter.

MINING IN FINLAND

Even in pagan times people in Finland had learnt to make iron from the plentiful supply of lake ore in the country. Nevertheless there was no actual mining until the middle of the 16th century, when iron ore mining was commenced. During the following centuries the iron industry, based upon the resources of raw materials obtainable in the country, did in fact experience periodic bursts of activity but generally speaking the ore supplies were too insignificant and poor to ensure working on a long-term plan. In addition to iron, other metals, for instance copper and tin, were mined in Finland in days gone by, but never to any considerable extent.

Mining was practically at a standstill when, in 1910, the Outokumpu ore was discovered. It was not until the 1920's, however, that the great economic importance of this ore was realized and the Outokumpu mine was turned into an undertaking of considerable size. This proved to be the signal for intensified prospecting for ore, and this yielded good results. At

the end of the 1930's, and during the latter years of the war, mining was commenced on the newly discovered ore deposits at Petsamo, Nivala, Mätäsvaara, Haveri, and Ylöjärvi. The Petsamo district, with its rich nickel mine, was ceded to the Soviet Union in accordance with the terms of the armistice of 1944.

If we examine the course of development since 1944, it will be seen that mining in Finland has continued to grow at a rapid pace, which is gratifying. New ore deposits have been worked and the volume of production has been doubled. Thanks to technical progress this has been possible without any considerable increase in the manpower engaged in mining.

The increase in and distribution of output as regards the different mining companies and the mines owned by them are given in the table below. An estimate is also given (in brackets) of the probable output of the various mines in 1955 and 1956.

Outokumpu Oy, Orijärvi Oy and Otanmäki Oy are State-owned undertakings. Oy Vuoksenniska Ab is the sole representative of private enterprise.

With the rise in output productivity has simultaneously also increased, as is shown below.

Thus, the total productivity of the mines has been nearly doubled during the postwar period, by reason of the large scale mechanization and rationalization of the work in the mines. This process of modernization has not yet been completed, so that, in all probability, a further improvement in productivity may be expected within the next few years.

THE FINNISH MINES

A short description of the mines mentioned is given below.

The Outokumpu mine, in the district of Kuusiärvi, has for more than 40 years been the most important of Finnish mines. The major proportion of the copper and iron pyrites produced in Finland come from it, and for a long time to come Outokumpu will play a leading part in supplying the country with these raw materials. In the mill feed, the annual average of the copper content has, during the last ten years, fluctuated between 2.90 and 3.49 per cent and the sulphur content has been about 22-23 per cent. A new central shaft, known as Keretti, and the concentrator, workshops, stores etc. connected with it, were put into operation at the endof 1954.

The output of chalcopyrites from the mine is processed in the copper smelter of the Outokumpu company at Harjavalta, and further refined in the metal works at Pori (Björneborg). The output of con-

centrated iron pyrites satisfies a major proportion of the sulphur requirements of the Finnish sulphuric acid plants and sulphite cellulose mills.

The Ylöjärvi mine, in the district of Ylöjärvi, started operation in 1943. During the last ten years the copper content in the ore has averaged between 0.79 and 1.10 per cent.

The Nivala or Makola mine, in the district of Nivala, was abandoned in the summer of 1954, because the known ore deposit, which contained nickel and copper, had been exhausted.

The Aijala copper ore deposit, in the district of Kisko, was first mined in 1948 and production commenced in the following year. The annual average copper content of the mill feed has been 1.55—2.12 per cent. This ore also contains iron pyrites, which are dressed in a separate concentrate. On an annual average, the sulphur content of the ore has been between 12.5 and 15.5 per cent.

The Metsämonttu zinc mine is only about one kilometre from the Aijala mine in the district of Kisko. The ore contains about 4 per cent of zinc and 15 per cent of sulphur. The ore is taken in lorries from the mine to the Aijala ore dressing plant.

The Vihanti zinc mine, in the district of Vihanti, is the most recently installed mine of the Outokumpu company. In order to work the deposit, two shafts have been sunk. The mill was started at the end of 1954, and full production should be reached in 1956. It is calculated that the ore contains approximately 10 per cent of zinc and appreciable quantities of copper, lead and iron pyrites. The last-named mineral occurs in part in separate bodies, the mining of which depends upon the sales of iron pyrites. Vihanti is well on the way towards developing into a mine of considerable size.

The Orijärvi mine, as do Aijala and Metsämonttu, lies in the district of Kisko. The Orijärvi ore deposit was discovered as early as 1757 and since then has been mined at longer or shorter intervals. During the last decade the materials to be dressed have had an annual average content of 2.22—3.38 per cent of zinc, 0.57—1.19 per cent of copper and 0.67—1.45 per cent of

lead. At the end of 1954, output ceased for the time being, as the known reserves of ore were almost exhausted, but prospecting has been continued in the hope that the existence of fresh supplies of ore may be established.

The Otanmäki mine, in the district of Vuolijoki, is the only iron mine in Finland. During the first year of actual production. 1954, 504,000 tons of rock were hoisted, of which 108,000 tons were used as macadam for railway construction, and 396,000 tons were passed through the ore dressing plant. Of this amount, 134,000 tons of magnetite concentrates were extracted with an iron content of 65.6 per cent, 51,000 tons of ilmenite concentrate with titanium dioxide content of 44.5 per cent. 3,000 tons of iron pyrites, and 28,000 tons of macadam for road surfacing. All the products have found markets both at home and abroad. experience of the first year of operation shows that a larger output, better grade in ore, and higher quality of product can be expected than is indicated by the above figures. Now under construction is a plant for pelletising the magnetite concentrates and for extracting their considerable content of vanadium.

The *Mätäsvaara* molybdenum mine, in the district of Pielisjärvi, was abandoned in 1947 as unprofitable.

The Haveri mine, in the district of Viljakkala, started production in 1942. The mining, partly carried on in open workings, is based on a gold content of slightly more than 3 grammes per ton of rock, extracted by means of flotation and cyanidation. The crude ore contains a few tenths of one per cent of copper, and also a little silver.

In 1954 mining at the localities above referred to formed a basis of an output of, inter alia, the following quantities of raw materials:

To a major extent, this output supplies Finland's requirements in iron pyrites, copper, silver, and gold. A proportion of these raw materials is also exported, for instance considerable exports have been maintained of copper in various stages of refining. The greater part of the other products enumerated is exported; at present Finland lacks the technical facilities for higher stages of refining these products in accordance with the scale on which they are produced. Highgrade nickel-copper matte, which was processed in Finland, is no longer produced, as the Nivala mine has been abandoned.

As has already been stated, a considerable increase in output may soon be expected, particularly as regards zinc concentrate, magnetite and ilmenite. Subsequent development, on the other hand, will depend upon the extent to which new reserves of ore are discovered, and new ore deposits found. The reserves of the existing mines are not inexhaustible; a large proportion of the mines are at present working with a policy covering but a few years, and it is only at Otanmäki, Outokumpu and Vihanti that the known reserves of ore are rather big.

PROSPECTING

In view of the intensity with which prospecting is being carried on at present in this country, it is permissible to regard the future development of Finnish mining with a certain degree of optimism. Among the important investigations that may, in the near future, lead to productive mining, mention should be made of the exploration of the Outokumpu company at Orijärvi, already referred to, and those of the Vuoksenniska company in the village of Sirkka in the district of Kittilä, where there has been started experimental underground mining of a vein deposit containing precious metals. It is still too early to express an opinion as to whether these prospects will lead to the commencement of mining.

At present prospecting on a considerable scale is being carried on by the Geological Survey and by the State-owned companies Suomen Malmi Oy and Outokumpu Oy, as well as by the privately owned companies of Oy Vuoksenniska Ab, Oy Prospektor Ab, Malmikaivos Oy and Hackman & Co.



In 1951, the Geological Survey began the systematic mapping of magnetic indications by means of a magnetometer installed in an aeroplane. This mapping has already produced many interesting results, and has contributed in no small way to a keener interest in prospecting, both in Government and private circles, that has been clearly apparent in recent years. From this year onward, electrical prospecting will be carried out simultaneously with the aero-magnetic flights, and this will further increase the

importance of air-prospecting in the advancement of searching for ore.

Mining in Finland, compared with many other branches of industry, occupies a comparatively modest position, but it is young and expanding, and, in view of the fact that the greater part of the country is still unexplored as far as ore prospecting is concerned, it does not seem improbable that in the future the mining industry may contribute to a considerable extent towards the development of the country's trade.
