THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW.

THE MONEY MARKET.

The state of the money market was a quiet one during January. As is usual in the winter months, bank credits increased owing to forest work. Part of these amounts returned to the banks in the shape of deposits, but the rise in long-term deposits and amounts deposited on savings accounts in banks and savings banks was considerably larger. The severe winter with ice formation which already extends far out into the Baltic and the consequent difficulties for navigation have also not been without influence on trade with foreign countries and on the money market.

Deposits in the Joint Stock banks increased by no less than 196.3 million marks. Of this amount 91.4 millions referred to actual deposit accounts as compared with only 56.5 million marks on an average for January during 1921—1925. The banks' credits rose by 97.4 million marks, so that the tension between credits and deposits was reduced by 38.9 millions to 1,014.7 million marks. The tension has thus been reduced since January, 1925, by 290.1 million marks and since the corresponding date in 1924 by no less than 974.8 millions.

In the position towards other countries, too, an improvement may be recorded. The indebtedness remained practically unaltered, while foreign balances rose by 18.7 million marks. The net indebtedness fell off by 18.9 million marks to 174.7 millions as against 300.0 millions a year earlier. Foreigners deposits in marks, which had been reduced during 1925 by

98.1 million marks, decreased by 2.1 million marks to 314.3 millions. It may therefore be said that the reduction of this account continues, but at so slow a pace that it creates no difficulties whatever for the money market.

The changes which occurred in the position of the Bank of Finland in January are, to a great extent, a result of the Government, as usual during the winter months, when customs duties do not bring in much and only an unimportant part of the direct taxes comes in, withdrew considerable sums for its requirements from its current account. The reduction on this account in January amounted to 63.8 million marks. In spite of this, however, the note circulation was reduced to some extent, viz., by 17.7 million marks, which is less than usual in this month. On the other hand the reserve of foreign currency fell off by 47.2 million marks to 1,360.8 millions. The note reserve, which had dropped considerably in December, rose again by 46.1 millions to 809.5 million marks as compared with 586.3 millions a year before.

During the first week in February the position of the Bank underwent some changes, which are worth noting. In the first place, the reserve of foreign currency was reduced by 153.5 million marks. This was mainly due to the foreign credit of the Bank of Finland having terminated and to the Bank having instead entered into an agreement with the Bank of England for an amount which, in Finnish marks, is 141.6 millions less than the credit (see Items, page 27). While the tendency was in other respects in the

same direction as in the previous weeks, it is to be noted that rediscounts have again begun to rise, constituting an increase for this week of 34.0 million marks. Am increase of the special borrowing of the Joint Stock banks from the Bank of Finland is also normal for this time of year, when forest work ties up capital and exports suffer owing to the ice conditions.

After the introduction of the currency reform the gold reserve and any changes which may occur in it are liable to arouse special attention. In the last few weeks the alterations have been quite insignificant. During the first fortnight a little over 100,000 marks were withdrawn altogether, but later the gold reserve increased again, so that on February 8th it was about 50,000 marks greater than at the beginning of the year.

To illustrate the state of the money market the following circumstances may also be mentioned. The turnover on the Stock Exchange has grown regularly since August and was two or three times greater than a year ago during the last few months. The exchange index for stocks and shares has also shown a regular advance from 118 in April to 147 in December, though in January the tendency was weaker. It should also be noted that protested bills, both a regards number and amount, show a marked improvement as against the state of things in 1924 and at the beginning of 1925.

The level of prices had a decided falling ten-The cost of living index, which had dency. fallen steadily since September, dropped 31 points during January and was 7.9 % lower than in September. The fall is principally due to lower prices for foodstuffs, but firewood and taxes have also contributed to the result. the case of the wholesale price index the movement was a similar one, but weaker. August it has fallen 4.6 %; in January the drop was 26 points. The movement of prices was favourable to Finland's balance of trade in January, seeing that the index for articles of export rose 15 points, while the index for articles of import fell 19 points.

TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

The turnover of trade in January was small. Owing to the severe ice conditions and large imports during December it was less than for the first month in preceding years. The value of imports amounted to 287.2 million marks as against 321.3 millions in 1925 and 378.5 millions in 1924, and the value of exports 197.3 million marks as against 240.4 millions and 216.7 millions in the preceding years. In this way a surplus of imports arose amounting to 89.9 million marks, which exceeded the corresponding surplus of imports in 1925 by about 10 million marks, but which was considerably smaller than the same figures for 1924 and 1923.

The timber market has been rather quiet of late, owing chiefly to the fact that British importers were waiting for the publication of the Russian lists of goods. These have now arrived and it turns out that the prices are below the prices asked by Finnish exporters. As the supply, as regards quantity, this year does not exceed, but is more likely to fall below last year's, Finnish exporters are likely to wait quietly without attempting to compete with goods from the White Sea by lowering prices. Sales of sawn pine and spruce amounted to about 320,000 standards by the middle of February. England, Holland, France and Belgium were the principal buyers. The market for plywood and for products of the paper industry continues to be satisfactory.

THE LABOUR MARKET.

Conditions on the labour market are quiet and satisfactory for the season of the year. Unemployment is considerably smaller than was feared in the autumn. The number of those seeking employment has, as customary in January, risen slightly, but is considerably below last year's figures, when the snowless winter presented obstacles for forest work. About 3% more workpeople are engaged in industry than in January, 1925.

The import- and export-indices have been calculated by the Statistical Dept. of the Board of Customs in the following manner:
the quantities of imports and, respectively, exports for the current year have been multiplied by the average price for the class of goods in question in 1913, after which the import (or export) value for the current year has been calculated in percentage of the sum thus obtained for purposes of comparison.

The goods chosen for the setting-up of a total-index have been divided, according to their use, into the groups: foodstuffs, clothing, agricultural requirements and other goods. The three last-named have been further divided, according to their purpose, into raw materials, machinery and industrial products.

This import-price index is lower than the wholesale price index because the import-price index is not influenced by the customs duties.

The index is calculated by the Social-Statistical Department of the Central Statistical Office and is based on monthly reports from 21 different centres; it shows the rise in the cost of living for a workingman's family of normal size, the income of which amounted during the years 1908—1909 to 1600—2000 Fmk, assuming that the average monthly consumption within the same remained unaltered. The index for total cost of living is the average based on weight of the different indices.

The index is worked out at the Central Statistical Office's Department for Economic Statistics. — In determining the bases of calculation for the index the combined value of the country's production and imports for 1913 are taken into account without deducting the value of exports. The total number of commodities included is 135, and the figures in brackets at the head of the columns indicate the number of commodities in the corresponding groups. — In working out the index figures the method known as proportionate prices is employed, i. e. the price of each commodity is taken in a percentage ratio to a corresponding figure for the basic period and the average is then calculated on the basis of the resultant proportionate figures. CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND.

1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; since 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6th, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The Diet together with the President possess the legisilative power of the country. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The present President L. Kr. Relander is elected for the term 1 March, 1925 to 1 March. 1931.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The proportions of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1924 are as follows:

2. LAND.

THE AREA is 388,483 square kilometres = 150,222 square miles, (Great Britain's area is 89,047 sq. m. and Italy's area 117,982 sq. m). Of the total area 11.4% are lakes. On an average 10.8% of the land in the south of Finland is cultivated, 0.9% in the North, 6.3% of the whole land. Of the land area 25.3 mill. ha (62.5 mill. acres) or 73.4% are covered by forests.

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE in the coldest month is in S. W. Finland — 5° to — 6° C., in Lappland — 15° C. and during the warmest month + 15° and + 18° to + 14° C. resp. The average temperature in Helsinki is + 4.6° (in Oslo + 5.4° , in Montreal + 5.4° , in Moscow + 3.6°). The ground is covered by snow in the South during about 100 days, in Central Finland luring 150 to 180 days, in Lappland about 210 days.

3. POPULATION.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1924): 3.5 millions, of which 0.2 million emigrants, (in Sweden (1924) 6.0, in Switzerland (1923) 3.9, in Denmark (1924) 3.4 and in Norway (1924) 2.8 millions).

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1924): In South-Finland 17.8, in North-Finland 2.3 and in the whole country an average of 10.2 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

LANGUAGE (1920): Finnish speaking 88.7 %, Swedish speaking 11.0 % others 0.3 %.

RELIGION (1924): Lutheran 97.3 %, Greek-Orthodox 1.7 % others 1.0 %.

DISTRIBUTION (1924): 82.7 % of the population inhabit the country, 17.3 % the towns and urban districts. The largest towns are (1924): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 207,954 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 60,412, Tampere (Tammerfors) 51,035, Vilpuri (Viborg) 46,961.

EDUCATION (1920): Amongst persons over 15 years of age only 1.0 % are illiterate. Three universities founded 1640, 1917 and 1920.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1924): Births 22.4 $^{9}/_{00}$, deaths 15.3 $^{9}/_{00}$ (in France in 1924 17.2 $^{9}/_{00}$, and in England in 1924 12.2 $^{9}/_{00}$), natural increase 7.1 $^{9}/_{00}$.

4. INDUSTRY.

PROPORTIONS OF OCCUPATIONS OF THE POPULATION (1920): agriculture 65.1 %, industry and manuel labour 14.8 %, commerce 3.5 %, other occupations 17.7 %.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND. The land area is distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 52.1 %, State 39.7 %, Joint Stock companies 6.5 %, communities 1.8 %.

FOREST RESOURCES. The growing stock of the forest is 1,620 million m^* (57, 213 million cubic feet). The marketable timber (measuring 20 cm at breast height = 6 in. at a height of 18 ft.) amounts to 1,557 million trees. Of this number pine is represented by 61%, spruce by 28%, the confiers thus constituting 89% or 1,384 million trees, leaftrees, mostly birch, 11% or 173 million trees. The annual increment is 44.5 million m^* (1,568 million cub. ft.). The annual working up according to earlier calculations is 40 million m^* (1,413 million cub. ft.). In North Finland the increment is much larger than the working up, but in South Finland excess working up occurs locally.

AGRICULTURE. Cultivated land 2.1 million hectars, divided as follows: area under cultivation 0.4—10 hectars 38.7 %, 10—15 ha 48.9 %, 50—100 ha 9.3 %, over 100 ha 8.1 %. Cultivated land was divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 46.8 % hay, 20.4 % oats, 11.1 % rye, 5.3 % barley, 3.2 % potatoes, 13.1 % other. The number of dairies in 1923 amounted to 510.

INDUSTRV (1924): Number of industrial concerns 3,213, hands 139,387, gross value of products of industry 9,331 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1925): 4,758 km, of which 4,458 km State railways and 300 km private. The gauge is 1.524 m. COMMERCIAL FLEET (1924): Sailing ships 615 (92,374 reg. tons net.), steamships 600 (98,883 r. t.), motor vessels 117 (15,659 r.t.), lighters 3,493 (276,372 r. t). Total 4,825 (478, 288 r. t.).

5. FINANCE AND BANKING.

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to the Great War the currency maintained its stable gold value and after the disturbances caused by the war Finland has again from January 1st, 1926 a gold standard. The unit of currency is the mark (Finnish markka) = 100 pennies. The gold value of 100 marks is equal to 2.5185 = 2.5185 = 10.01

STATE FINANCES. According to the balance sheet for 1924 the State revenue was 3,217.0 million marks of which 3,158.2 million marks were ordinary revenue, and State expenditure 3,149.5 million marks, of which 2,530.3 million marks were ordinary expenditure. The principal sources of rvenue were as follows: State property and undertakings 1,071.9, direct taxes 486.8, indirect taxes 1,212.2, miscellaneous taxes 161.4, charges 135.9, miscellaneous revenue 148.7. The value of State property in 1922 as estimated at 11,150.6 million marks. For National Debt see table 15 in this issue.

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the Budget for 1925 expenditure amounted to 868.4 million marks. Income from taxatlon was 304.0 million marks, taxed income 4,097.3 million marks. The communal income tax (not progressive) averaged 7.7% of the ratenayers' income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland, (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head-office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vassa (Vassa), Oulu (Uleaborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Sortavala, Viipuri (Viborg), Mikkeli (S.t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä and Kotka.

THE JOINT STOCK BANKS (1924): Number 19, possess 433 branch offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. Including all banks, there is one banking establishment per 7,500 inhabitants.

The largest banks are: Ab. Nordiska Föreningsbanken, Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Helsingfors Aktiebank and Ab. Unionbanken, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1924): Mortage banks 6, Savings banks 464 Co-operative Credit Societies 1,060 and a Central Bank for the latter.

FINLAND'S OFFICIAL STATISTICS

SUMMARY.

In Finland, as in most other countries, the oldest statistical sources consist of documents which originated for some practical purpose, although subsequently it proved possible to subject them to scientific statistical treatment. Setting these aside, it may be said that Finland's official statistics had their origin in the middle of the eighteenth century, for in 1749 the well-known Swedo-Finnish ,,tables archives" (tabellverket) were started which in the course of time proved the forerunners of the censustaking institutions of other countries. As early as the eighteenth century it entered into the duties of the Governors to supply regular information as to economic conditions in their provinces and in this lies the origin of Finland's economic statistics.

It was, however, only in 1865 that the first actual statistical department was established, which developed into the Finnish Central Statistical Office. Side by side with it a number of statistical offices grew up later in connection with certain central and other departments. Thus the official statistical work is organised on the principle of decentralisation, although of late certain changes have been introduced tending to a greater centralisation of the different branches of statistics in the hands of the Central Statistical Office.

Statistical data which are published by the respective statistical departments, are included as separate series in the combined "Finland's Official Statistics".

The most important branches of Finland's official statistics and their present extent are reviewed briefly below.

STATISTICS OF POPULATION.

The publications dealing with statistics of population (series VI) extend, in addition to a

review which in some parts dates back to 1749, as far back as 1865 and illustrate, on the one hand, the annual fluctuation of population with its factors, and on the other, the numbers of inhabitants and the demographic composition of the population at various periods, since 1880 at the close of every decade. The statistics are very copious, comprising, as they do, all those aspects of the population which are generally illustrated by modern statistics of population in other countries. As no actual general census has been taken, but the information is based on the entries in the parish registers, the data in regard to the division of the population according to profession and trade, as well as social status, in particular, are not quite satisfactory. These figures for the whole country are amplified by the data obtained in the actual census taken every ten years in the larger towns of Finland.

The statistics of population are closely connected with the statistics of emigration (XXVIII). Detailed statistics for the latter are extant since 1900, while for earlier years only the numbers of emigrants are available.

ECONOMIC STATISTICS.

The oldest economic statistics are based, as already stated, on the reports of the Governors of provinces, whose statistical information has been uniform and systematic since 1878. Such statistics have, however, lost much of their importance in juxtaposition to more modern, precise and reliable special statistics of various phases of economic life.

In the first place trade statistics (I A) should be mentioned, which extend back to 1856. They now appear partly in the form of annual reviews, partly in monthly reports. The statistics deal with foreign trade and the composition of exports and imports according

to classes of goods is given in the annual publication, both value and quantity being stated. Imported goods are divided into 1,602 classes and exports into 529. Further, figures are given for the value and quantity of trade with different countries, as well as for the separate Customs districts and particulars of the amounts received by the Custom House. The monthly reports, too, contain corresponding particulars with only a few exceptions, though in a slightly condensed and abbreviated form.

The shipping statistics (I B) which were published from 1856 to 1902 as part of the trade statistics, and subsequently as separate annual publications, have now appeared since 1923 in two parts. In one part shipping between Finnish and foreign ports is dealt with; the other contains details of the merchant shipping and its value, entries and crews.

The regular yearly publication of agricultural statistics (III) began in 1908. They contain particulars principally of the employment of the land area, crops, stocks of cattle, dairies, available farm labour and labourers' wages. In addition, every ten years a report is published in greater detail on the state of agriculture.

There are no general statistics concerning the large forests of Finland. The official forestry statistics (XVII) only treat of State forests. These statistics which date from 1885, deal partly with the extent of the State forests and the supplies of timber, and partly with the forestry work and income and expenditure.

The regular industrial statistics (XVIII) were started in 1884. Up to 1908 they also included particulars of places, where handicraft was carried on, but since 1909 only factory statistics, while statistics of handicraft were collected only for 1913 and 1923 and published separately. In the industrial statistics the number of industrial institutions in various branches of industry is given, the number of workpeople, their combined wages, the value of raw materials used and the gross value of production. Further, figures are published, for instance, of the size of the industrial institutions, owners and production, with an enumeration of the most important kinds of goods.

Annual railway statistics (XX) have been published since 1871. These deal chiefly with State railways which constitute overwhelming majority of the network of Finnish railways. The statistics provide a detailed illustration of the traffic on the railway network and its different lines and sections, as well as its financial results. With regard to private lines a few concise details were published formerly in the annual reports of the Road and Waterways Board, but since 1923 they have been included among the railway statistics.

The position of banking business is shown in three series of annual publications. statistics regarding Joint Stock and Mortgage banks (VII C), initiated in 1910, should be referred to first. In these the position of the banks at the end of the year is given, their Profit and Loss accounts, turnover on the principal accounts, security for credits granted, bonds and protested bills. Other branches of banking are dealt with partly by the Savings Banks statistics (VII A) and partly by the Post Office Savings Bank statistics (VII B), the former dating from 1870, the latter from 1887. The position of the Joint Stock banks at the end of each month has, besides, been published since 1910 in the Monthly Report on Banking Statistics (VII D).

Insurance is dealt with in two series of yearly publications (XXII A and B). In the former, which has appeared since 1892, the business of the public insurance companies in various branches of insurance is treated of, their own risks and re-insurance being separately dealt with, as also the position of the companies and business results. The statistics include, in addition to Finnish companies, also such foreign ones as are entitled to carry on insurance business in Finland. The other series deals with the local fire and cattle insurance associations.

Special series of financial statistics appeared comparatively late among the official statistics. Statistics referring to Communal finance (XXXI), beginning with the year 1910, are not published annually, but for a number of

years at a time, and include the finances of both town and rural communities, more particularly their expenditure, receipts, liabilities and assets. Since 1907 statistics of the estate left by deceased persons (IV A) have been published for certain years, comprising, too, details of stamp dues received for inventories and wills. As the Government has introduced an income and property tax, statistical reports on the question of incomes and property in Finland and their taxatation are in course of preparation.

In addition to the statistical series referred to, statistics dealing with various economic conditions appear, too, in a number of other statistical series and publications, but want of space precludes detailed reference to them.

OTHER SERIES IN THE OFFICIAL STATISTICS.

Of the published series included in "Finland's Official Statistics" several are mainly annual reports of departments, of no great general interest. Other series, however, affect important aspects of public life. A few of the most important of these may be recapitulated.

Statistics of social matters are represented, for instance, by the following series: Poor Law Relief (XXI) since 1881; Accidents to work-people (XXVI A) since 1898; Relief Funds (XXVI B) since 1899; Prisoners'Welfare (XII) since 1882; and Land Tenure (XXX). The last is published in four series (A—D) referring partly to conditions of land tenure and partly to various phases of colonising work, and start in some cases in 1910, in others later. Further, Special Inquiries into Social Questions (XXXII) are published at intervals on various topics. In addition shorter investigations are included in the Social Review, which also contains some current statistics.

Of other regular series the following should also be mentioned: National education (X) begun in 1883; Elementary schools (IX) in

1884; Legal statistics (XXIII) in 1891; Postul statistics (XIII) in 1885; Election statistics (XXIX) illustrating the elections to the Diet since 1907, when the first elections were held after the introduction of the single chamber system; and Medical statistics (XI) since 1884.

OTHER STATISTICS.

Apart from the collected "Finland's Official Statistics" special statistical publications, of an official character, are issued, some of them in regular series. Above all the Statistical Year Book for Finland deserves mention, having appeared annually ever since 1879. It reprints in condensed form the most important results of the special series, and besides, a quantity of statistical material on subjects which are not dealt with elsewhere. A collected work of another kind is the monthly review "Statistical Reviews" in which principally such statistical data are published as are obtained monthly, but also the results of lesser statistical investigations andpreliminary details \mathbf{of} others. Reference should likewise be made to the investigations with regard to the returns for agriculture which have appeared yearly since A number of more or less extensive special inquiries, carried out by special Government commissions, may be referred to the same category.

If a complete idea of the statistics published in Finland be aimed at, it must not be lost sight of that separate communities in particular the municipalities of Helsinki (Helsingfors) and Turku (Åbo), publish a large number of statistical series and that private initiative, too, issues regular statistics, for instance, the central cooperative institutions.

On the whole, although there are still a few gaps to fill, it is possible by means of the printed statistics, to obtain a manysided and detailed view of economic, social, cultural and other conditions in Finland.

THE LEVEL OF PRICES IN FINLAND IN 1925.

The value of the Finnish mark abroad during 1925 was quite stable, the dollar rate of exchange remaining unchanged at 39:70 marks. In comparison with other foreign gold currency some fluctuations occurred in the value of the mark, but not to any greater extent than the rates of exchange record even between gold currencies. Those changes which occurred during the year in the level of prices, as shown below, must not therefore be looked upon as indications of changes in the value of the currency, but were due to the prices of goods and were partly of a seasonal nature.

The movement of prices will be seen in the following series of figures, which indicate the level of the wholesale price index and the cost of living index for the separate months.




The figures show a falling tendency for the cost of living index from December to May, followed by quite a sharp rise during the summer months and a renewed drop in the autumn. This was due chiefly to the fluctuations in price of foodstuffs and to a rise in the level of rents in June.

The movement of the wholesale price index was not so clear, but a rising tendency preponderated during spring and summer and a fall was apparent in autumn. This movement is more clearly to be followed in the diagrams on page 26, which also show how the level of prices for various classes of goods varied. As will be seen, the movement of prices during 1925 was not uniform, but, on the contrary, the prices of various classes of goods show a very varied movement. It should be noted in particular that the level of prices for both imports and exports shows a falling tendency, while the level of prices for such goods as are produced and consumed in Finland rose slightly. The prices of imports fell rather more than the prices of exports, which is, of course, an advantage for Finland's balance of payments. However, the price index for exports is still below the index for imports, so that a further levelling is desirable.

If the average indices for 1924 and 1925 are compared, it will be seen, however, that the level of prices has risen to some extent. The wholesale price index was, on an average, 1,100 for 1924, but 1,129 for 1925, while the corresponding figures for the cost of living index were 1,170 and 1,212. This is a result of the level of prices having risen in 1924, whereas in 1925 almost exclusively seasonal fluctuations occurred, which were so that both the wholesale price index and the cost of living index stood at a slightly lower figure in December, 1925, than a year before.

The diagrams on page 26 cover the whole period since 1920 for the sake of comparison. If the course of the movements is followed for the last six years, it will at once be noticed that former great variations have been evened up and the lines have become regular and level. The explanation lies, of course, chiefly in the fact that former sharp changes in the level of prices were a consequence of fluctuations in the value of the currency, while the latter is now stable. But even the changes which were due to the price of goods alone, have of late not been as great or contradictory as before.





ITEMS.

Arbitration agreement between all the northern countries. Negotiations have been going on during January between representatives of the Finnish Government and the Governments of the Scandinavian countries with regard to drawing up arbitration conventions with each of When the delegates had come to those states. an agreement in regard to the draft of the conventions and the latter had been laid before the Governments concerned, the convention with Sweden was signed on January 29th, the convention with Denmark on January 30th and the convention with Norway on February 3rd. All the conventions have it in common that all disputes are to be submitted to the decision of the regular international courts or arbitration tribunals.

National Debt. In the course of January the National Debt of Finland was reduced by 12.0 million marks and the booked value on the last day of January was 2,463.3 million marks. A year before the National Debt was 2,277.9 million marks, so that an increase of 185.4 millions had occurred. Through the exchange of bonds between the Treasury and the Bank of Finland (see Bulletin 1926 No. 1, p. 33) the division of the National Debt in regard to internal and foreign debt underwent a change. The foreign debt rose in January by 78.5 millions to 1,792.5 million marks, while the internal debt was reduced by 90.5 millions to 670.8 million marks. Compared with the position a year earlier, the foreign debt increased by 397.3 million marks, while the reduction of the internal debt amounted to 211.9 million marks. Calculated at the present rates of exchange the National Debt amounted to 3.640.5 million marks, which is equivalent to 91.7 million dollars as compared with 85.1 million dollars a year ago.

The foreign credit of the Bank of Finland. The foreign cash credit which was taken up by the Bank of Finland at the beginning of February, 1924, through Stockholms Enskilda Bank. the National City Bank of New York, Hambros Bank, N. M. Rothschild & Son and the Westminster Bank for strengthening the reserve of foreign currency and which latterly stood in the books at 256.2 million marks, was allowed to lapse on February 1st this year. It was never employed and is now unnecessary. In order, however, to have assets for strengthening the reserve of foreign currency, if necessary, the Bank has assured itself of an overdraft at the Bank of England amounting to 600,000 pounds or 114.6 million marks.

Selling association for Finnish plywood. On the initiative of A. Ahlström Osakeyhtiö, Aktiebolaget Kaukas Fabrik and Saastamoinen Faneri Osakeyhtiö a new association was formed recently, the Finnish Plywood Factories Association, which is to undertake all sales for the members both in Finland and for export. Negotiations have been started with the other plywood factories with a view to their joining the association.

It will be remembered that the plywood industry has developed extraordinarily in the last few years. Prior to the war there were only two plywood factories in existence, but the number has now risen to 14 and several others are in course of construction. The total production is estimated to reach about 50,000 tons of a value of approximately 135 million marks. The production is principally intended for export, and exports of plywood from Finland are larger than from any other country. As competition with other countries, and especially with Russia, has become keener in the course of time, the need

for an association in the plywood industry has been felt for a long time past.

Bank dividends. The dividends of the Joint Stock banks in Finland paid out of net profits tor 1923 and 1924 and those proposed to be paid out profits for 1925 are as follows:
