#### THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW.

THE MONEY MARKET.

The trend of the money market in October and the beginning of November proceeded in the same direction as earlier in the autumn. The state of the market was calm, though with a tendency towards greater stringency. This tendency was largely due to the fact that during the past weeks the foreign short-term indebtedness was reduced still further, as well as to people being forced by the hard times to consume their savings. The issue of some internal bond loans also affected the stringency of the money market. - The fall in the value of sterling that caused so much uneasiness abroad also increased the difficulties of foreign exchange for Finland, seeing that Finnish exports are paid to a considerable extent in sterling, while the greater part of the country's indebtedness is in foreign currency that is still bound to gold. From the Finnish point of view, therefore, it is desirable that the pound should recover as soon as possible.

Deposits in the Joint Stock banks continued to fall off in October, though the decrease did not amount to more than 124.9 million marks in comparison with 136.9 millions last year and 173.8 and 238.5 millions in September and August this year. Their credits were also reduced, though to a smaller extent than deposits or by 66.0 million marks. The corresponding figure for October, 1931, was 10.4 millions, while the reduction in September and August this year amounted to 30.4 and 45.9

millions respectively. The increase in the tension between the credits and deposits of the banks that was caused thereby evoked a slight increase in bills re-discounted at the Bank of Finland.

The position of the Joint Stock banks towards foreign countries experienced very small changes in October, with the result that their net foreign indebtedness rose 5.4 million marks to 67.9 millions.

The position of the Bank of Finland is also marked by stringency. The Bank's supply of foreign currency, which had been reduced during the previous months, fell off in October by 34.5 million marks and thus amounted at the end of October to 464.5 millions compared to 365.4 millions a year ago. The total credits granted by the Bank, which had gradually grown since June, increased in October by 46.6 million marks to 1,219.6 millions. before the credits amounted to 1,157.3 millions. The rise in credits referred partly to the direct credits and partly to re-discounted bills, which rose by 17.4 million marks to 246.6 millions against 324.9 millions a year previously. The note circulation was reduced slightly as usual in October and thus reached the lowest monthly figure since 1919 at 1,065.6 million marks. The note reserve was reduced by 18.4 million marks to 507.2 millions and was appreciably larger than the corresponding figure, 392.9 millions, a year ago.

During the first fortnight in November the development was in the same direction. The total credits of the Bank of Finland increased by 38.9 million marks principally on account of re-discounted bills rising 33.9 million marks to 280.5 millions. The supply of foreign currency fell off again to a slight extent or by 23.0 million marks. On the other hand the note reserve increased by 17.2 million marks to 524.4 millions.

The level of prices did not undergo any change worth mentioning during October.

#### TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

Foreign trade was still fairly lively in The value of imports amounted to 395.7 million marks in comparison with 367.6 millions in September and 349.9 millions in October, 1931. For exports, too, higher figures were returned; their value amounted to 470.7 million marks compared with 454.8 millions in September and only 396.7 millions in October last year. In this way the balance of trade for October provided a surplus of exports amounting to 75.0 million marks compared with 46.8 millions last year and a small surplus of imports for the same month in 1930. For the whole completed period of the current year the surplus of exports amounted to 1,005.5 million marks in comparison with 714.8 and 288.2 millions respectively for the two pre-The very positive balance of ceding years. trade is, of course, a result of the country having redeemed part of its indebtedness and therefore not being able to afford to import commodities.

If the exchange of commodities in various classes is examined, it will be seen that imports of rye that had been very considerable during the earlier months, ceased altogether in October. On the other hand the imports of bran, raw hides, hot rolled and sheet iron and raw cotton and wool were fairly large during that month.

Among exports the high figures for exports of mechanical pulp, sulphite cellulose, meat and cheese attract attention. Butter exports were also slightly livelier in October than in the same month last year.

During October sales of sawn timber were fairly lively, amounting to approximately 85,000 standards. This practically completed the sale of the supplies available this year, only insignificant quantities being left. the middle of November the total sales are estimated at about 680,000 standards, of which 579,000 standards had already been shipped before the end of October. About 10,000 standards have been sold from Finland for delivery next year. As the sales are so small, it is not yet possible to form an idea on the basis of the sales as to prices for next year.

#### THE LABOUR MARKET.

The number of unemployed increased slightly in October, as was expected, for unemployment in Finland bears a seasonal character to a large extent. According to the reports of the Unemployment Boards the total number of unemployed amounted to about 73,400 at the end of October. It should be noted, however, that this figure includes not only the 23,500 persons put on to the relief work organised by the Government and communes, but also about 5,600 persons who were provided with work through the Unemployment Boards in so-called free work organised on public funds for the relief of unemployment. For the sake of comparison it may be mentioned that the total number of unemployed at the end of October, 1931, was 68,200. It should also be stated that lumber work this winter is expected to be on a considerably larger scale than last winter, which should relieve the labour market. There are already a number of places, where it seems difficult to find workmen for work in the forests.

The wholesale price index is worked out at the Central Statistical Office. — The first group of indices is based on the quantity of goods in local wholesale trade in Finland, whereas the indices for imported and exported goods are based on the total quantities of goods imported or exported, including the movement of such goods as are in no way intended for wholesale trade in Finland. The average prices for 1926 are taken as a basis. There is no direct weighing of the data regarding prices, but indirect weighing has been carried out by each class of goods being represented by the number of commodities which corresponds to the calculated importance of the class in wholesale trade. #### CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND.

#### 1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; after 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6th, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The legislative power of the country is vested in the Dlet and the President. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The present President P. E. Svinhujvud is elected for the term 1 March, 1931, to 1 March, 1937.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The proportions of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1980 are as follows:

#### 2. LAND.

THE AREA is 388,217 square kilometres = 149,981 square miles, (Great Britain's area is 89,047 sq. m. and Italy's area 117,982 sq. m.). Of the total area 11.5 % are lakes. On an average 10.8 % of the land in the south of Finland is cultivated, 0.9 % in the North, 6.3 % of the whole land. Of the land area 25.3 mill. ha (62.5 mill. acres) or 73.4 % are covered by forests.

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE in the coldest month is in S. W. Finland —  $5^{\circ}$  to —  $6^{\circ}$  C., in Lappland —  $15^{\circ}$  C. and during the warmest month +  $15^{\circ}$  and +  $18^{\circ}$  to +  $14^{\circ}$  C. resp. The average temperature in Helsinki (Helsingfors) is +  $4.8^{\circ}$  (in Oslo +  $5.4^{\circ}$ , in Montreal +  $5.4^{\circ}$ , in Moscow +  $8.6^{\circ}$ ). The ground is covered by snow in the South for about 100 days, in Central Finland for 150 to 180 days, in Lappland about 210 days.

#### 3. POPULATION.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1980): 3.7 millions (of which 0.3 million emigrants), Sweden (1930) 6.1, Switzerland (1929) 4.1, Denmark (1930) 3.5 and Norway (1930) 2.8 millions.

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1930): In South-Finland 18.6, in North-Finland 2.5 and in the whole country an average of 10.7 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

LANGUAGE (1930): Finnish speaking 89.4 %, Swedish speaking 10.1 %, others 0.5 %.

RELIGION (1930): Lutheran 96.6 %, Greek-Orthodox 1.6 %, others 1.8 %.

DISTRIBUTION (1980): 81.4 % of the population inhabit the country, 18.6 % the towns and urban districts. The largest towns are (1929): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 234,096 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 65,291, Viipuri (Wiborg) 55,010, Tampere (Tammerfors) 54,824.

EDUCATION (1920): Amongst persons over 15 years of age only 1.0 % are illiterate. There are three universities founded 1640, 1917 and 1920.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1930): Births 20.6 % of deaths 13.2 % (in France in 1980 15.7 % of, and in England in 1980 11.4 % o), natural increase 7.4 % o.

#### 4. INDUSTRY.

PROPORTIONS OF OCCUPATIONS OF THE POPULATION (1920): agriculture 65.1 %, industry and manual labour 14.8 %, commerce 3.4 %, other occupations 16.7 %.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND. The land area is distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 52.1 %, State 39.7 %, Joint Stock Companies 6.5 %, communities 1.7 %.

FOREST RESOURCES. The growing stock of the forest is 1,620 million m³ (57,213 million cubic feet). The merchantable timber (measuring 20 cm at breast height = 6 in. at a height of 18 ft.) amounts to 1,557 million trees. Of this number pine is represented by 61 %, spruce by 28 %, the confiers thus constituting 89 % or 1,384 millon trees, leaftrees, mostly birch, 11 % or 173 million trees. The annual increment is 44.5 million m³ (1,568 million cub.ft.). The annual fellings according to earlier calculations are 40 million m³ (1,413 million cub. ft.). In North Finland the increment is much larger than the fellings, but in South Finland excess felling occurs locally

AGRICULTURE. Cultivated land 2.2 million hectars, divided as follows: area under cultivation 0.4—10 hectars 33.8 %, 10—50 ha 48.9 %, 50—100 ha 9.3 %, over 100 ha 8.0 %. Cultivated land is divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 47.1 % hay, 21.2 % oats, 10.2 % rye, 5.1 % barley, 3.2 % potatoes, 13.2 % other. The number of dairies in 1928 amounted to 630.

INDUSTRY (1930): Number of industrial concerns 3,773, hands 144,931, gross value of products of industry 11,285 million marks

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1930): 5,331 km, of which 5,065 km State railways and 266 km private. The gauge is 1.524 m.

COMMERCIAL FLEET (1931): Steamships 527 (151,266 reg. tons net), motor vessels 150 (15,145 r. t.), sailing ships 311 (64,621 r. t.), lighters 3,729 (266,179 r. t.). Total 4,717 (497,211 r. t.).

#### 5. FINANCE AND BANKING.

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to the Great War the currency maintained its stable gold value and after the disturbances caused by the war Finland has again from January 1st, 1926, a gold standard. The unit of currency is the mark (Finnish \*markka\*) = 100 pennis. The gold value of 100 marks is equal to  $$2.5185 = £ -... 10 s. 4 \frac{1}{6} d.$ 

STATE FINANCES. According to the balance sheet for 1931 the State revenue was 3,975.1 million marks of which 3,755.6 million marks were ordinary revenue, and State expenditure 4,245.6 million marks, of which 3,654.2 million marks were ordinary expenditure. The principal sources of revenue were as follows: State property and undertakings 1,275.7, direct taxes 492.2, indirect taxes 1,348.6, miscellaneous taxes 204.5, charges 225.1, miscellaneous revenue 429.0. The value of State property in 1922 is estimated at 11,150.6 million marks. For National Debt see table 19 in this issue.

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the Budget for 1931 expenditure amounted to 1,365.0 million marks. Income from taxation was in 1929 428.4 million marks, taxed income 6,380.2 million marks. The communal income tax (not progressive) averaged 6.7 % of the ratepayers' income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland, (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head-office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Porl (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vasa), Oulu (Uleåborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Sortavala, Vilpuri (Wiborg), Mikkeli (St. Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä and Kotka.

THE JOINT STOCK BANKS (1932): Number 12, possess 498 branch offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. Including all banks, there is one banking establishment per 6,600 inhabitants.

The largest banks are: Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Ab. Nordiska Föreningsbanken and Helsingfors Aktiebank, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1982): Mortgage banks 6, Savings banks 478, Co-operative Credit Societies 1,394 and a Central Bank for the latter.

## THE CENSUS OF 1930 AND THE GROWTH OF POPULATION IN FINLAND DURING THE LAST DECADE.

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#### THE TAKING OF THE CENSUS.

A census is taken in Finland every ten years at the end of those years that conclude the even decades. The materials collected in this way consist of controlled abstracts of the two official registers of population, viz. the parish and the civil registers. The civil register is the register of population for all persons who do not belong to any religious congregation. The abstracts are supplied by the churchwardens of each parish separately and by the civil registrars for each town and commune. The materials contain data with regard to the division of the population according to sex, age, civil standing, language, education, faith and occupation.

The census goes a long way back in Finland. Such information was collected for the first time for the year 1749. At first a census was taken at intervals of only about a year, later every five years. Since 1880 the intervals between two consecutive census have been ten years. In addition to these statistics of population a census has been taken since 1870 in the largest towns of Finland and their vicinity. This is a census in the modern sense, as individual census papers are used and are filled in by the individuals themselves. In connection with them particulars have been obtained regarding housing and living conditions in the various places.

#### NUMBER OF POPULATION.

Some preliminary data concerning the results of the general census of 1930 are now available.

These refer to the total number of the population and the division of the population according to language, faith and age. As the statistics of education and occupation have been completed, these parts of the census will be dealt with in a separate article in this Bulletin.

The total registered population of Finland amounted to 3,667,067 persons on December 31st, 1930. During the last half-century the population has grown as follows.

In the last few census, since 1910, a distinction has been made between the persons entered in the registers of the various communes and actually resident there and such inhabitants as were outside the limits of their native com-With the inmune, although registered there. creased mobility of the population and especially since emigration acquired a larger extent the total registered population no longer responds to the actual numbers, seeing that emigrants generally remain on the books of their native communes, in spite of their having in many cases definitely settled abroad. The population of Finland resident in its native communes, which - although not fully corresponds most closely to the actual extent of the population, amounted to 3,380,748 persons at the end of 1930, while the nonresident part, to the greatest extent domiciled beyond the frontiers of the country, was 286,319 persons.

During the periods from one census to another the increase in population, in absolute figures and in percentage of the population at the beginning of the period, was as follows.

During the decade 1921—1930 the increase in population was slightly higher than during the preceding period of ten years. In comparison with 1901—1910, however, the increase in population has fallen off very much. When it is considered that the civil war and severe epidemics occurred during 1911—1920, which greatly retarded the growth of the population, the increase in population of the latest period appears very small, for during the years 1921—1930 the conditions were in every respect normal. The mortality was very favourable. The poor growth of population was consequently due entirely to the great falling off in births.

Although the growth of population in Finland during the last ten years proceeded more slowly than during earlier normal periods, it is nevertheless comparatively large in comparison with conditions in the other countries of Western and Northern Europe. During 1921—1930 the growth of the population in the following countries, expressed in percentage of the population in 1920, was as follows:

These figures of population are the results of very varying conditions of population. To-

gether with Hungary Finland has the highest rate of nativity of these countries, but the surplus of population, for instance in Denmark and Belgium, is approximately as large in spite of the lower birthrate in these countries, because the conditions of mortality in them are more favourable than in the two former countries. In one country, France, immigration from other countries has also contributed towards the increase in population. In order to illustrate these conditions particulars are given below for 1930 of births, deaths and the difference between them per thousand of the average population.




### DISTRIBUTION OF POPULATION ACCORDING TO SEX.

Of the total population in Finland in 1930 1,809,069 were males and 1,857,998 females. The excess of females was 48,929 and there were 1,027 females per 1,000 males. The disproportion between the number of men and women caused by the Great War, is not apparent in Finland to any great extent, the male population having, indeed, suffered considerable losses during the civil war, though these are not comparable to the losses suffered by the countries that took part in the Great War. At the same time it should be mentioned that the number of women per 1,000 men was 1,096 in England, 1,066 in Germany and 1,103 in France. - During the last decade the proportion between the number of men and women has remained entirely unchanged.

#### URBAN AND RURAL POPULATION.

The rural population still predominates in Finland, although the population of the towns





regularly grows at a more rapid pace the population in the country. In1930 altogether 671,845 persons or 18.3 per cent dwelt in the towns and 2,995,222 or 81.7 per cent in the country. During 1921-1930 the urban population grew by 128,799 persons or almost one fourth, and the rural population by 173,461 persons or only one sixteenth. The population of the so-called urban districts (boroughs or country-towns) is included in the rural population, though it is really more closely allied to the towns than to the country. Besides there are a number of densely populated districts especially in industrial centres and suburban areas in the vicinity of towns, that have townlike settlements. If these are classified in the same category as the towns, the following figures are obtained:


The increase in the urban population has in the course of time become more and more dependent on immigration from the country-side. This is shown by the following figures which record the total increase in the population of the towns since 1880 and that part of it that is due to the excess of births over deaths. The balance is caused by the surplus of immigrants and by the incorporation of suburbs situated in the vicinity of the towns.



Although the urban population increased almost fourfold during this period of fifty years, the excess of births over deaths, after rising up to 1910, fell off again in absolute figures. During the ten years 1921-1930 it was about as small as for 1881-1890. Calculated per thousand of the average population of the towns, this represents an enormous reduction: from 7.9 per thousand in the 1880's to 2.8 per thousand for 1921—1930. At the same time the excess of births over deaths in the rural districts dropped from 14.5 to 9.2 per thousand, also a considerable falling off. The proportion per thousand in the rural districts was, nevertheless, during the last decade still more than three times the corresponding figure for the towns.

This reduction in the excess of births was chiefly due to the fall in the birthrate, which was especially marked in the towns. During 1881—1890 the birthrate in the towns avaraged 29.2 per thousand of the population, whereas in 1921—1930 it was only half that figure or 15.0 per thousand. With regard to the rural population the corresponding development was





as follows: the birthrate was 35.6 per thousand in 1881—1890 and 23.6 per thousand for the last decade. The reduction is consequently approximately one third in this case.

During this half-century the deathrate also fell off, although to a far smaller extent than in the case of the birthrate. This is proved by the following figures.

While the difference in the figures of births in the towns during 1881—1890 and 1921—1930 was 14.2 per thousand, the corresponding difference in deaths was 9.1 per thousand. In the rural districts the development in this respect proceeded rather more slowly. The difference between the figures for births for these two decades was 12.0 per thousand, while the figures for deaths recorded a difference of 6.7 per thousand.

## DISTRIBUTION ACCORDING TO LANGUAGE.



Since the last census the Finnish speaking element has increased considerably more than the Swedish speaking. Of the population 88.7 per cent were Finnish speaking in 1920, in 1930 they formed 89.4 per cent, whereas the proportion of Swedish speaking people to the total population has dropped slightly, from 11.0 per cent in 1920 to 10.1 per cent in 1930. The change in the proportion between the two language groups has proceeded in favour of those speaking Finnish throughout the entire period of fifty years during which such language statistics have been collected.

#### CONFESSION OF FAITH.

Finland is exceptionally uniform in regard to confession of faith, as 96.6 per cent of the population belonged to the Lutheran church in 1930, this being the established church of the State. A little over 60,000 persons belonged to the Greek-Orthodox church, i.e., not even 2 per cent of the population. During the last decade there has been a noteworthy change in the liberty of conscience, as the law concerning the freedom of faith came into force from the beginning of 1923. According to this law persons are allowed to leave the church without being compelled to join any religious congregation. However, the increase in the number of people of no confession has been very small. At the end of 1930 altogether 50,807 persons




were entered in the civil register, which is the register of population for people not belonging to any confession. The law of liberty of conscience has also encouraged the establishment of freethinking congregations. However, a very insignificant number have joined them; a little over 4,000 persons were members of the free congregations in 1930.

#### DISTRIBUTION ACCORDING TO AGE.

Appreciable changes have occurred of late in the distribution of the population according to age. As the number of children born alive has fallen off in absolute figures from year to year, the lowest age classes have become less numerous than the preceding ones which are derived from periods of a higher birthrate. The distribution of a population according to age in a normal state of growth can be illustrated graphically by means of a pyramid, the base being formed by the lowest age classes and the pyramid gradually growing narrower towards the top, the higher age classes. In 1930 the population of Finland was distributed according to age in a manner differing considerably from the distribution a couple of decades ago, when the birthrate was still high. The three lowest parts of the age diagram for that year up to the age class 20-30 years inclusive are almost of the same breadth, and it is only from that point that the diagram grows narrower to a marked extent.

In the diagram illustrating the division according to age in 1900 a reduction is noticeable in the comparative size of the lowest age class, while the next two ten-year classes increased slightly in importance. In 1930 the lowest age class, 0-9 years, had been reduced to about 20 per cent of the population in comparison with about 24 per cent in 1900 and 25 per cent in 1880. The next category, persons of 10-19 years of age, represented a smaller part of the population in 1930 than at the end of the century. This is due to the influence of the extremely low birthrate during part of the decade 1911-1920, in which this generation The age class 20-29 years, which was born. was born before the great fall in the birthrate began, is, on the contrary, represented on a considerably larger scale than ever before. If the comparative size of this age-class is considered and it is also noted that the greatest number of marriages are made in this class, the fall of the birthrate already referred to appears even greater than is shown by a superficial examination.

The economic consequences of the change in the divison of the population according to age, referred to above, have partially a very considerable bearing. At present the most striking fact is that the ages best capable of work are



represented most strongly, whereas childhood is represented more weakly than before. The productive capacity of the population as well as the supply of labour is consequently proportionately larger than before, which, at a time of economic disorganisation and unemployment, certainly accentuates these phenomena to some extent.

Detailed figures concerning the division according to age for the towns and rural districts separately, are not yet available. However, the census held in the largest towns of

Finland and earlier observations indicate that the division according to age in the towns differs appreciably from the age division in the country. The age classes from 15 to 40 are represented to a considerably larger extent in the towns that in the rural districts. This may be explained by the fact that the greater part of the population that has immigrated into the towns consists of persons belonging to these very age classes. In the rural districts, on the contrary, these age classes are represented to a comparatively weaker extent.

#### ITEMS.

The Diet. The Diet assembled on November 3rd to continue the ordinary autumn session. The Diet has some heavy work before it, for in addition to the Budget for 1933 it has to deal with a considerable number of Government proposals, several of which are connected with the existing crisis. Among the bills that aim at relieving the consequences of the crisis in agriculture, the proposed stabilisation of prices for butter and cheese, the tax on margarine, mixtures of fat and certain kinds of cattlefood may be mentioned, as well as the extension of credits granted by Maakiinteistöpankki Oy. for stabilising the indebtedness of farmers. Mention should also be made of the proposals for re-

organising the telephones and telegraphs and for amending the law concerning spirits with a view to introducing a freer sale of beer of medium strength and abolishing the so-called black days, on which no selling of alcoholic liquor is allowed, and of the proposals regarding a new banking law.

Finland and the Oslo Convention. The Finnish Government recently announced its desire to join the so-called Oslo Convention. This convention was entered into in December, 1930, by Belgium, Luxemburg, Holland, Denmark, Norway and Sweden with a view to an economic rapprochement between these count-

ofThe Governments these ries. countries declared their willingness to support and encourage international efforts to reduce the obstacles to trade and improve the conditions of the exchange of commodities in general, as well as to examine the possibilities of extending the principles of the convention to other spheres of economic rapprochement. All the signatories to the convention undertook not to raise their rates of duty without preliminary negotiation.

Internal bond loans. In the last days of October the subscription lists were opened for Government bonds with a view to securing funds for organising public works for the relief of unemployment. The amount of the loan is 1.00 million marks and the bonds are for 10,000 marks each at 7 per cent interest. The loan is for 10 years. The bonds are being issued at a price of 95 per cent.

The City of Helsinki (Helsingfors) has also invited subscriptions for its new bonds. The amount of the loan is 55 million marks, but only 20 millions are to be issued this year. The issue price is 98 per cent and the rate of interest 8 per cent. The loan is to be repaid entirely by 1947 and the redemption, beginning in 1935, is to proceed by purchase in the open market and by drawing.

The Finnish merchant fleet. In the course of this year the Finnish merchant fleet has been increased considerably by the addition of new vessels. During January—September 34 vessels were acquired of 67,400 gross reg. tons and 43,000 net reg. tons. The greater part were steamers, their number being 26 drawing 53,200 gross and 33,400 net tons. Four motor vessels were acquired drawing 7,400 gross and 4,400 net tons, and the same number of sailing ships. During the same time 14 vessels were removed from the merchant fleet, of which 8 were sailing ships, 5 steamers and 1 motor vessel. At the end of September the Finnish

merchant fleet consisted of 961 vessels drawing 438,800 gross and 282,000 net reg. tons. These were divided as follows among the different classes of vessels:

During the past nine months the gross tonnage of the fleet has consequently increased by about 18 per cent.

Sulphite agreement. In the last days of October a meeting of the fiduciary council of the European sulphite cellulose organisation, Sulphite Pulp Suppliers, was held, at which it was established that the statistical position, especially in regard to stocks, was satisfactory. It was resolved to regulate production in accordance with consumption in 1933, too, and therefore to prolong the agreement at present in force with regard to the restriction of output. The reduction next year will comprise 25 per cent and will be calculated quarterly in order to avoid an accumulation of cellulose.

Co-operation of North European Kraft paper manufacturers. The negotiations that have been going on for some time between Kraft paper manufacturers in Sweden, Norway and Finland have now resulted in the forming of an association called "Scankraft" with the object of stabilising the market for Kraft paper. The association proposes to achieve its object by fixing joint prices and regulating production.

Large order for wallpaper from England. The Finnish wallpaper mills, which exported considerable quantities of wallpaper prior to the war, chiefly to Russia, have had difficulty in securing fresh foreign markets since then. Now it is stated, however, that Sandudds Fabriks A.B. has received large orders, principally from England.



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
