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THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW.

THE MONEY MARKET.

The state of the money market remained unchanged during August and the first weeks of September.

Deposits from the public in the Joint Stock banks were reduced in August by 26.0 million marks and deposits from other credit institutions by 23.0 millions. Altogether deposits, which had grown without interruption since February, decreased by 49.0 million marks. The falling off was due to the cost of getting in the harvest and to the collection of municipal taxes. On the other hand the credits granted by the Joint Stock banks were also reduced by 59.2 million marks, of which 45.2 millions referred to credits to the public and 14.0 millions to credit granted to other credit institutions. For the sake of comparison we may mention that there was a pronounced relaxation in August, 1934, deposits in the banks increasing by 59.9 million marks, while credits fell off by 86.3 millions. Nevertheless, the position of the Joint Stock banks was easier at the end of August this year than it had been a year ago; then deposits exceeded credits by 381.3 million marks, but now the excess of deposits was 486.4 millions.

Perhaps the most important change in the position of the Joint Stock banks was that in August they increased their holdings of bonds by 53.4 million marks to 798.2 millions. This change was accompanied by a corresponding

decrease in the unusually large cash of the banks from 598.7 to 526.0 million marks.

The position of the Joint Stock banks towards other countries recorded only slight changes in August: the foreign credit balances dropped to some extent and the indebtedness grew slightly. The final result was that the net balances fell off by 9.4 million marks to 188.6 millions. The corresponding balances amounted to 210.4 millions a year ago and 105.0 millions two years ago.

In the position of the Bank of Finland it is particularly worth noting that the gold reserve, which had in general undergone quite insignificant changes, increased very much during the month under review. According to the weekly statements the gold reserve increased during the last fortnight in August from 324.8 to 400.8 million marks and during the first fortnight in September to 450.8 millions. Thus the total increase amounted to 126.0 million marks, in which connection it should be noted that the gold was booked according to the old valuation prescribed in the monetary law of 1925. The gold purchases are reflected in the reserve of foreign currency that was reduced during the weeks referred to by 99.8 million marks. September 14th the reserve of foreign currency amounted to 1,225.6 million marks in comparison with 1,110.9 millions a year ago.

The credits granted by the Bank of Finland remained unchanged on the whole in August:

they fell off by 6.0 million marks. During the first fortnight in September they decreased by a further 11.1 millions and on the 14th of the month they amounted to 766.2 million marks as against 839.6 millions a year before. The note reserve was reduced in August by 17.5 million marks, but increased again during the first fortnight in September by 59.1 million marks to 901.9 millions as compared with 857.7 millions a year ago.

The level of prices did not experience any great change in August. The wholesale price index remained unaltered at 90 as during most months for the past two years. The cost of living index rose 16 points to 1,012 in consequence of the seasonal fluctuations in the price of foodstuffs that is usual at this time of the year.

TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

As usual at this season of the year, foreign trade was lively. Both exports and imports were rather larger in August than last year in point of volume, but the tendency of prices was adverse. The result was that, while the value of imports amounted to 457.2 million marks as against 408.7 millions last year, the value of exports fell off to 723.3 million marks from 747.8 millions in August, 1934. In this way the balance of trade for August recorded a fairly large surplus of exports amounting to 266.1 million marks, though it failed to reach the same level as last year, when the surplus of exports amounted to 339.1 million marks.

If we examine the balance of trade for the whole period from January to August, we will also find that, although it is positive, it is not so to the same degree as in the exceptionally

favourable years 1934 and 1933. At that time the surplus of exports amounted to 862.4 and 827.6 million marks respectively, but this year only to 459.5 millions.

By the end of August the total sales of sawn timber were estimated at about 750,000 standards in comparison with 835,000 standards on the same date in 1934. During January-August 610,300 standards were shipped as against 649,800 standards last year. In September negotiations were lively in the timber market, but an agreement was only arrived at in a few cases, as exporters maintained their prices and importers were not inclined to pay them, seeing that prices for Russian goods had been reduced. However, as the demand, especially for redwood, is by no means satisfied in Great Britain and the total imports of timber are considerably below last year's, experts are of the opinion that the demand for Finnish sawn timber is still likely to grow. Nevertheless, exporters will probably have to expect slightly reduced prices, although at the same time importers may have to be prepared to raise their bids.

THE LABOUR MARKET.

As was to be expected, the number of unemployed increased again slightly in August after the usual seasonal minimum for the year had been passed. The number of unemployed registered by the Unemployment Boards amounted to about 4,700 at the end of August as compared with 3,700 at the end of July. For the sake of comparison we may mention that the number of unemployed at the end of August, 1934, amounted to about 11,000 and a year before that to no less than 22,600.

CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND.

Number

1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; from 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6th, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The legislative power of the country is vested in the Diet and the President. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The present President P. E. Svinhujvud is elected for the term March 1st, 1931, to March 1st, 1937.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The proportions of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1933 are as follows:

2. LAND.

THE AREA is 388,217 square kilometres = 149,900 square miles (Great Britain's area is 89,047 sq. m. and Italy's area 117,982 sq. m.). Of the total area 11.5% are lakes. On an average 11.8% of the land in the south of Finland is cultivated, 1.1% in the North, 6.6% of the whole land. Of the land area 25.3 mill. ha (62.5 mill. acres) or 73.6% are covered by forests.

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE in the coldest month is in S. W. Finland — 5° to — 6° C., in Lappland — 15° C. and during the warmest month + 15° and + 13° to + 14° C. resp. The average temperature in Helsinki (Helsingfors) is + 4.6° (in Oôlo + 5.4° , in Montreal + 5.4° , in Moscow + 3.6°). The ground is covered by snow in the South for about 100 days, in Central Finland for 150 to 180 days, in Lappland about 210 days.

3. POPULATION.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1933): 3.7 millions (of whom 0.2 million emigrants), Sweden (1933) 6.2, Switzerland (1932) 4.1, Denmark (1932) 3.6 and Norway (1933) 2.9 millions.

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1933): In South-Finland 18.9, in North-Finland 2.6 and in the whole country an average of 10.9 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

DISTRIBUTION (1983): 79.8 % of the population inhabit the country, 20.2 % the towns and urban districts. The largest towns are (1933): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 268,592 inhabitants, Viipuri (Wiborg) 71,817, Turku (Åbo) 69,041, Tampere (Tammerfors) 58,220.

OCCUPATION (1930): agriculture 59.6 %, industry and manual labour 16.8 %, commerce 4.3 %, transport 3.8 %, other occupations 15.5 %.

LANGUAGE (1930): Finnish speaking 89.4 %, Swedish speaking 10.1 %, others 0.5 %.

RELIGION (1933): Lutheran 96.2 %, Greek-Orthodox 1.8 %, others 2.0 %.

EDUCATION (1980): Amongst persons over 15 years of age only 0.9 % are illiterate. There are three universities founded in 1640, 1917 and 1920.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1933): Births 17.4 °/00, deaths 12.9 °/00 (in France in 1931 16.2 °/00, and in England in 1931 12.3 °/00), natural increase 4.5 °/00.

4. TRADE AND COMMUNICATIONS.

FOREST RESOURCES. The growing stock of the forest is 1,620 million m³ (57,214 million cubic feet). The merchantable timber

(measuring 20 cm at breast height = 6 in. at a height of 18 ft.) amounts to 1,557 million trees. Of this number pine is represented by 60.7 %, spruce by 28.1 %, the conifers thus constituting 88.8 % or 1,383 million trees; leaftrees, mostly birch, 11.2 % or 174 million trees. The annual increment is 44.4 million m³ (1,568 million cub. ft.). The annual fellings according to earlier calculations are 40 million m³ (1,413 million cub. ft.). In North Finland the increment is much larger than the fellings, but in South Finland excess felling occurs locally.

AGRICULTURE (193°): Cultivated land 2.2 million hectars, divided as follows: area under cultivation 0.3—10 hectars 33.4%, 10—50 ha 52.1%, 50—100 ha 8.4%, over 100 ha 6.1%. Cultivated land is divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 50.7% hay, 18.9% oats, 9.6% rye, 5.4% barley, 3.3% potatoes, 12.1% other. The number of datries in 1933 amounted to 627.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND. The land area is distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 52.1 %. State 39.7 %, Joint Stock Companies 6.5 %, communities 1.7 %.

INDUSTRY (1933): Number of industrial concerns 3,527, hands 140,736, gross value of products of industry 10,837 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1933): 5,574 km, of which 5,319 km State railways and 255 km private. The gauge is 1,524 m,

COMMERCIAL FLEET (1934): Steamships 548 (251,890 reg. tons net), motor vessels 157 (17,323 r. t.), sailing ships 218 (61,168 r. t.). Total 923 (330 381 r. t.).

5. FINANCE AND BANKING.

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to the Great War the currency maintained its stable gold value and after the disturbances caused by the war Finland has again from January 1st, 1926, a gold standard. The unit of currency is the mark (Finnish markka) = 100 penniä. According to the monetary law of December 21st, 1925, a gold coin of 100 marks' value shall contain 3 15/10 grams of fine gold. Since October 12th, 1931, the redemption of bank notes in gold is, however, suspended.

STATE FINANCES. According to the balance sheet for 1934 the State revenue was 4,135.7 million marks of which 3,366.9 million marks were current revenue, and State expenditure 4,100.7 million marks, of which 2,599.2 million marks were current expenditure. The principal sources of revenue were as follows: State property and undertakings (net) 320.3, direct taxes 485.0, indirect taxes 1,815.6, stamp duty 165.7, charges 94.8, interest and dividends 184.2 and capital revenue 768.8. The value of State property in 1922 is estimated at 11,150.6 million marks. For Public Debt see table 19 in this issue.

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the Budget for 1984 expenditure amounted to 1,429.1 million marks. Income from taxation was calculated at 466.4 million marks, taxed income at 4,978.4 million marks. The municipal income tax (non-progressive) averaged 9.4% of the ratepayers' income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland, (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head-office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vasa), Oulu (Uleåborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Sortavala, Vilpuri (Wiborg) Mikkeli (S.t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä and Kotka.

THE JOINT STOCK BANKS (1935): Number 9, possess 473 offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. Including all banks, there is one banking establishment per 7,300 inhabitants.

The largest banks are: Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Ab. Nordiska Föreningsbanken and Helsingfors Aktiebank, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1935): Mortgage banks 6, Savings banks 482, Co-operative Credit Societies 1,342 and a Central Bank for the latter.

SOME FEATURES IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE FINNISH WOODPULP INDUSTRY

NATURAL ADVANTAGES.

The principal sources of national wealth in Finland are the forests and the rapids; they are the green gold and the white coal of this country. They are also the main factors, on the basis of which the Finnish woodpulp industry has developed to its present size and attained the position, alongside the sawmill industry, of a most important exporting industry.

Finland is rich in forest resources. Three-quarters of the land area or 25 million ha (63 million acres) are covered by forest. Among European states only European Russia possesses larger forests. Sweden has almost as much forest as Finland. Calculated per head of population, Finland has 7.22 ha of forest (Sweden 3.80, Norway 2.67, European Russia 1.20).

Of these timber resources close on three-quarters consist of conifers, pine and spruce. These species are, above all, the raw materials of the sawmills and pulpmills, to the needs of which they are excellently adapted.

Owing to its wealth of waterways Finland is also in a favourable position for manufacturing woodpulp. Power for the mills can be obtained from the numerous rapids, on the banks of which the mills are generally situated. The long and much ramified waterways leading to the different parts of the country provide excellent floating channels for the raw materials at a


comparatively low cost. Felling and transporting can be done in the winter, when good roads are formed by ice and snow. Floating is done in the spring, when the streams and rivers are in spate. There are about 47,000 km of channels suitable for floating, so that there are only 7.3 sq. km of land area and 5.3 sq. km of forest area to a kilometre of channel.

The Finnish woodpulp industry was started under these natural advantages and has developed in the course of the last 75 years from modest beginnings into a powerful factor in the international market.

THE MECHANICAL PULP INDUSTRY.

The Finnish woodpulp industry dates from the 1860's. Its first steps were not easy, for economic conditions in Finland were still undeveloped at the time. The country was under Russian rule, the population was sparse, means of communication were primitive and capital was scarce. The idea of freedom of trade was only beginning to cast off its bonds.

The initial difficulties were thus considerable and it required the persistent labour and great sacrifices of some pioneers to educate public opinion in favour of "wood rags", and to improve the quality. When these difficulties had been overcome, the growth of the industry proceeded at a rapid pace. Mechanical woodpulp mills were built at Mänttä, Kyröskoski, Walkiakoski, Kuusankoski, Inkeroinen etc. These places still



remain the strongholds of the woodpulp industry to the present day. During the succeeding decades the woodpulp industry extended still further.

Many fresh difficulties arose at that time. Competition between the mills increased the price of timber, while wages also tended to However, the greatest danger was the instability of the market. For this reason an association was formed in March, 1875, for selling to Russia, prices were agreed upon and the proportionate share in sales was fixed for each member. This decision was important, for it was fundamental for the collaboration that has characterised other branches of the Finnish exporting industry. From this association a permanent selling organisation developed subsequently, the Finnish Woodpulp Union (Suomen Puuhiomoyhdistys - Finska Träsliperiföreningen), which exists to this day in Helsinki.


By means of collaboration and chiefly thanks to the Russian market the mechanical pulp industry gradually developed. By the end of the century there were 27 mechanical pulpmills in Finland and in 1913 there were 45.

The Great War brought on considerable changes in the Finnish exporting industries. Communication with Western Europe grew difficult. However, the Russian market was still open and exports to the east attained larger and larger figures.

At the end of the war, on the collapse of Russia, that market was closed. There followed the critical years of 1918 and 1919, when the whole of the paper and pulp trade had to be directed entirely to the west, and new markets had to be found. After great efforts this was successfully accomplished, although it necessitated appreciable changes in the production, the improvement of the quality in order to meet the competition of other countries and the establishment of new connections in Western Europe and in overseas countries.

As a result of these efforts the mechanical woodpulp industry in Finland now has a firm foundation, on which further development can be built. The number of woodpulp mills and cardboard factories has not grown, but remains at about 50. At the same time improvements have constantly been made in the mills. Greater power is employed, technical methods have improved and the mills have been renovated. Both effect and quality are kept quite up-to-date, as is proved by the sure and steady growth of production and exports, with the exception of some short periods, as well as by the high quality that has gained the full approval and confidence of the market.

The recent development of the Finnish woodpulp industry and the growth of its production of late are shown in the accompanying diagrams. The quantities refer to dry weight.



The productive capacity of the woodpulp industry now amounts to about 750,000 tons of white and about 25,000 tons of brown woodpulp, if the latest extensions of mills are taken into account. The greater part of this is used for working up within the country either into paper or cardboard.

The following were the buyers of woodpulp in 1934: Great Britain was easily first with 180,000 tons, then France and the United States with about 15,000 tons each, Brazil with 11,000 tons and other countries with smaller quantities. The exports of eardboard were divided as follows according to the figures for 1934: Great Britain 28,000 tons, Denmark 7,000 tons, Germany close on 5,000 tons, the Argentine 4,000 tons and so forth.

THE CELLULOSE INDUSTRY.

About ten years after both the principal chemical processes of manufacturing fibre pulp from wood for the papermills, viz., the manufacture of sulphite cellulose and sulphate cellulose, had been invented and adopted in practice in the European and North American mills, the production of cellulose was begun in Finland, too.


The first Finnish cellulose mill was built in 1879—1880 at Walkiakoski, where a woodpulp mill and papermill had already been built in 1872. This mill manufactured sulphate cellulose. The

sulphite cellulose industry was started at Nokia, where a chemical pulpmill was added to the manufacture of mechanical pulp and paper in 1884—1885. Soon after, the next sulphite mills were erected at Kuusankoski in 1885—1886.

The manufacture of pulp was at that time no longer as novel and unusual in Finland as a couple of decades earlier, when the manufacture of mechanical pulp had to struggle with its initial difficulties. It soon grew lively; at the end of the century 9 cellulose mills were running and at the outbreak of the Great War there twice as many.

The output of cellulose was at first used exclusively for the requirements of the country's own papermills and thus became an addition to the manufacture of woodpulp, cardboard and paper that had already got under way. This is evident from the fact that the first cellulose mills were built in the centres of the paper and pulp industry. But by degrees the cellulose industry began to take its place as an independent branch of industry that acquired a market beyond the borders of the country.

The outbreak of the war affected exports to the west, but as the demand for cellulose in Russia continued to grow during the war, the cellulose industry in Finland was able to maintain its output. The cessation of imports from Germany forced the Russian papermills to increase their production in order to cope with



the growing demand, as imports from Finland only supplied a part of the consumption.

However, when conditions in Russia collapsed at the end of the war, the Finnish cellulose industry found itself in a position that called for a quick volte-face towards western markets. The former markets were suddenly closed; exports to the west, as far as they had been developed before, had been cut off during the war and trade was paralysed.

This situation led to the cellulose industry concentrating on combined selling. In 1918 the Finnish Cellulose Union (Finska Cellulosaföreningen — Suomen Selluloosayhdistys) was formed, with the object of disposing of the production of its members in foreign markets. All the sulphite and sulphate mills of the country joined the union.

The business of the union was at first by no means easy, but soon Finnish cellulose found a footing in foreign markets. The favourable development of the first years was largely due to the trade delegation, which the Finnish Government despatched at the beginning of 1919 to the Western countries in order to establish trade relations with them. Already in the course

of 1919 good relations were established with the leading countries in Europe and with North and South America.

On this basis the Finnish cellulose industry has subsequently developed. The ten years from 1920 to 1930 recorded a development in this industry that proved conclusively that it was a natural industry for this country. Trade relations have been stabilised, in the processes of manufacture the latest technical developments have been adopted, confidence in the quality has been strengthened. In this latter respect we must not overlook the collaboration of the Finnish Central Laboratory, which has regularly controlled the quality of the parcels exported since 1925.

The recent development of the Finnish cellulose industry will be seen in the above diagram, in which the quantities produced and exported in 1919—1934 are given in dry weight.

In 1934 exports of Finnish cellulose amounted to 802,000 tons, representing a value of 1,245 million Finnish marks. Of this total 597,000 tons were sulphite and 205,000 tons sulphate cellulose. The principal countries of export were Great Britain and the United States.

BETTORKS WHAT HE HOLD IS State timber auctions. The customary auctions of sawlogs and other timber from the State forests were held in Oulu (Uleaborg) on September 10th and 11th, in Tampere (Tammerfors) on September 13th and 14th and in Viipuri (Viborg) on September 16th and 17th. Altogether 1.0 million trees of standing timber were put up to auction and 1.4 million trees for delivery. In addition to some special lots 106,000 m³ of pulpwood, 93,200 m³ of large pitprops and sulphate wood, 9,800 m³ of firewood and 17,236 sleepers were also offered for sale. The final figures of the results of the auctions are not yet available, but prices had a falling tendency, representing on the whole about 10-30 per cent of last year's prices.

Kymmene Ab. The board of directors of Kymmene Ab. has decided to propose to the shareholders that the share capital, which amounts at present to 225 million marks, should be increased to 300 millions by issuing 75,000 new shares of a nominal value of 1,000 marks each at a price of 1,400 marks per share. It is intended to employ these fresh funds for financing the present and future building operations of the company and for acquiring a controlling interest in Oy. Läskelä Ab.

The latter company owns a sawmill, woodpulp mill and paper mill at Läskelä and a woodpulp mill, paper mill and cellulose mill at Harla-Leppäkoski, all situated in the south-eastern part of Finland. Its total annual production amounts to 15,000 standards of sawn timber, 20,000 tons of mechanical woodpulp, 20,000 tons of sulphite cellulose and 21,000 tons of paper. The forest owned by $_{
m the}$ company amounts approximately 100,000 hectares. According to the balance sheet on December 31st, 1934, the company's capital amounts to 39.6 million marks, to which 1.7 millions of other funds must be added. The depreciation account amounts to 28.0 million marks and indebtedness to 128.2

millions. - Even apart from this purchase Kymmene Ab. is one of the largest industrial companies in the country. Its total balance sheet at the end of December, 1934, amounted to 725 million marks, of which 522 millions represented the company's own funds and 203 millions foreign funds.

Kaukopää sulphate mill. At the end of September the manufacture of sulphate cellulose was started at the new sulphate mill of Enso-Gutzeit Oy, situated close to Vuoksenniska. The mill has been built for an output of 80,000 tons a year, but can be enlarged to 120,000 tons without any great extensions. Over 40,000 tons of the output, which consists principally of strong sulphate, have already been sold in advance.

The buildings of this large mill, recently completed, are 275,000 cub. metres in size. The chimney, 125 metres in height, is the highest in the North. About thirty dwelling houses have been built close to the mill for the staff and workpeople, as well as a private railway.

Tourist traffic. Tourist traffic was uncommonly lively in Finland last summer. number of foreigners arriving in Finland in January—August amounted to 46,900 in comparison with 38,300 last year. The number of Finns disembarking in Finnish ports during the same period amounted to 18,200 as against 14,200 in 1934. The increase in foreign travellers was thus 22 per cent and in Finnish travellers 28 per cent.

Crop prospects. Since the middle of August weather conditions have been unfavourable to growth and field work. Frost, which had occurred earlier in the northernmost provinces, occurred generally throughout the country and

was in some cases severe during the nights before the middle of September. The frost did appreciable damage to the spring sowings that had not yet been cut, and potatoes. The last few weeks have altogether been too rainy, so that the ripening of spring sowings has been delayed, autumn sowing has been made more difficult, harvesting has been interfered with and the quality of the crops has been adversely affected in part.

According to the preliminary estimates of the Board of Agriculture the prospects were as follows in the middle of September. In the table a scale of figures is employed, 8 signifying a very good crop, 7 a good crop, 6 above medium, 5 medium, 4 below medium, 3 a poor crop,

2 almost a failure of crop, and 1 a failure of crop.

This indicates that in general the harvest is expected to be slightly above medium, but in the case of barley and oats below medium. In comparison with 1934 the crop of most cultivated plants is estimated to be worse; only in the case of autumn wheat, potatoes and hay a slightly better result is expected than last year.

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
