# THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW.

THE MONEY MARKET.

During the winter foreign trade was hampered very much in Finland by the ice conditions. When the latter improved fairly rapidly at the beginning of April, imports became very lively and the problem of financing them made great demands on the banks. Further the work in the forests and timber floating during April required large sums. As, however, the banks were in a position to satisfy these credit requirements up to an appreciable amount, the position of the money market in April may be described as to some extent easier. It should be said, however, that this is to be taken comparatively. In Finland the demand for available capital still exceeds the supply to a considerable degree.

The deposits by the public in the Joint Stock banks increased by 66.9 million marks or by more than during the corresponding month last year. Of this amount 27.7 millions constituted long-term deposits. Treasury deposits were unchanged. During the first four months of the year the deposits by the public increased by 364.8 million marks and Treasury deposits by 40.9 millions. During the first four months of the previous year, which were exceptionally advantageous for an increase in deposits, deposits by the public only increased slightly more, viz., by 376.7 million marks, while the Treasury deposits decreased by 1.7 million marks.

Foreign mark desposits underwent no change worth mentioning in the course of April, as appears below.

Credits increased considerably during April, owing chiefly, no doubt to the causes already stated, viz., by 148.4 million marks, which is the largest increase for this year and also larger than the increase during the corresponding month flast year. In order to be able to cover such a large demand for credit the banks had to resort to additional borrowing at the Bank of Finland to a certain degree; re-discounts grew during April by 23.0 million marks. The first week in May showed a continued increase, which indicates that the demand for credit was still active.

The foreign indebtedness of the Joint Stock banks (of which over 90 % are deposits in marks) which has continually decreased since last November, grew slightly in April by 10.1 million marks to 683.8 millions. The increase, however, concerned a rise in the indebtedness in foreign currencies; mark deposits remained unchanged. On the other hand, foreign credit balances recorded a small increase of 12.1 million marks, so that the net indebtedness to foreign countries was reduced slightly by 2.0 million marks and amounted to 566.2 millions. Taking into account the amounts in marks purchased by the Bank of Finland for forward delivary and already paid for, but not yet delivered, the net indebtedness is reduced to 506.2 million marks.

The position of all the banks, including the Bank of Finland, towards foreign countries shows a net indebtedness of 101.6 million marks.

In this connection it is worth noting that the total foreign indebtedness of the Joint Stock banks at the end of April, 1923, was 1,117.4 million marks. As the indebtedness at the end of April this year (taking into account the mark amounts bought by the Bank of Finland for forward delivery) only amounted to 623.8 millions, it will be seen that Finland had reduced her floating foreign indebtedness in the course of a year by such a large amount as 493.6 million marks or about 12.8 million dollars.

With regard to changes in the position of the Bank of Finland it should be noted, first of all, that the reserve of foreign currency decreased during April by 143.4 million marks to 654.3 millions (including the foreign credit). As we have mentioned before, a reduction in the supply of foreign currency during spring and summer thas of late years become a regular seasonal occurence. The unusually large reduction during last April was probably brought about partly by the sudden activity in foreign trade, which in such a distant country as Finland usually shows itself first in an increase of imports. In the first week in May the reduction in the supply of foreign currency almost ceased, as the falling off only amounted to 8.2 million marks. The increased demand for credit was felt, too, at the Bank of Finland. Credits increased by 55.5 million marks in April and by 41.2 millions in the first week in May. The note circulation, after increasing for two months, began to fall off again in April, as is usually the case at this time of year.

In the value of Finnish currency no changes occurred during April. The wholesale price index rose, but only by 1 point to 1,095. The dollar exchange varied from 39: 85 to 39: 99 (the former quotation at the end of the month) or was thus, practically, unaltered.

### TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

In foreign trade for April attention is attracted primarily by the fact that the value of imports suddenly rose from 244.9 million marks during March to 426.2 millions during April. As the above review indicates, this change was due to the ice conditions, which had presented an obstacle to foreign trade in February and March, improving quickly. To some extent this increase also influenced the value of exports which increased from 125.9 million marks in March to 246.2 millions in April. But the increase in exports was less partly for the reason that a number of vessels which arrived with cargo had not yet sailed from Finland with their return cargoes. Thus, during April 141 vessels came into Finnish ports, but only 99 had sailed. Sawn woodgoods, the country's chief article of export, were scarcely shipped at all during April. This resulted in the value of imports exceeding the value of exports by 180.0 million marks. The surplus of imports since the beginning of the year to the end of April was 618.3 million marks, whereas the corresponding figure for last year was 544.7 millions. The difference was caused to a great extent by the imports of grain, for instance, seed oats, which were larger thanks to the bad crops last autumn.

After special liveliness during the first quarter of the year sales of timber fell off during April and the beginning of May to some extent. By the middle of May 430,000 standards had been sold for shipment this year from Finland, or rather more than usual. Of this quantity only an insignificant part had been shipped by the end of April, as is usual.

The paper, chemical pulp and mechanical pulp markets were in the same position as before, i. e. a little better than at the beginning of the year.

#### THE LABOUR MARKET.

As usual in the spring, when the demand for labour increases, strikes occurred here and there, but they were unimportant and local, so that the general state of the labour market can still be described as satisfactory.

This revised index series is based on the prices bid at the end of each month for 18 representative securities, viz., 4 bank, 12 industrial and 2 other kinds of shares. By multiplying the price bid for each security by the number of shares in the corresponding company the so-called Exchange values has been arrived at for the share capital of the company, the sum of which values has been calculated in % of the total nominal value of the share capital of the same companies. These percentages in the above table usually show a fall during March and April owing to the payment of dividends.

Up to Dec. 31, 1917, the last port of shipment and the first port of discharge were used in determining the respective countries of import and export. In the case of transportation of goods over land frontiers, the country from which goods arrived or that to which they were transferred was used in a similar sense, with the exception of a part of the exchange of goods with Russia, which was not put down to that country, but to the actual countries of import or export. From January 1, 1918, the country of import indicates the land in which goods were purchased, and country of export the land to which goods were sold.

The import- and export-indices have been calculated by the Statistical Dept. of the Board of Customs in the following manner: the quantities of imports and, respectively, exports for the current year have been multiplied by the average price for the class of goods in question in 1913, after which the import (or export) value for the current year has been calculated in percentage of the sum thus obtained for purposes of comparison.

The goods chosen for the setting-up of a total-index hade been divided, according to their use, into the groups: foodstuffs, clothing, agricultural requirements and other goods. The three last-named have been further divided, according to their purpose into raw materials, machinery and industrial products.

This import-price index is lower than the wholesale price index because the import-price index is not influenced by the custom duties.

The index is talculated by the Social-Statistical Department of the Central Statistical Office and is based on monthly reports from 21 different centres; it shows the rise in the cost of living for a workingman's family of normal size, the income of which amounted during the years 1908—1909 to 1600—2000 Fmk, assuming that the average monthly consumption within the same remained unaltered. The index for total cost of living is the average based on weight of the different indices.

The index is worked out at the Central Statistical Office's Department for Reonomic Statistics. — In determining the bases of calculation for the index the combined value of the country's production and imports for 1913 are taken into account without deducting the value of exports. The total number of commodities included is 135, and the figures in brackets at the head of the columns indicate the number of commodities in the corresponding groups. — In working out the index figures the method known as proportionate prices via employed, i. e. the price of each commodity is taken in a percentage ratio to a corresponding figure for the basic period and the average is then calculated on the basic of the resultant proportionate figures. The corresponding months in 1913 are taken as a basis. In the calculations geometrical averages are employed. No actual weighting of figures is undertaken; this is carried out, however, indirectly with the aid of the list of commodities.

This table, prepared from the weekly reports of the Labour Exchange Department of the Ministry of Social Affairs, shows the number of unemployed registered in the books of the communal labour exchanges in the majority of towns and a very small part of the rural centres of population at the close of the week nearest to the month's end. As agricultural labourers and skilled artisans proper register, up to the present, only in a minority of cases at the communal labour exchanges, the table does not give a complete review of the number of unemployed, but is to be regarded more as symptomatic.

The above particulars which are of a preliminary nature, have been compiled by the Social-Statistical Department of the Central Statistical Office. As they indicate, only a few cases of cessation of work on a small scale have interrupted peaceful labour conditions in Finland during the last few years. The most serious conflict in 1923 arose in the building trade in Helsingfors, lasting for two months, and among the stevedores in May, while the longest cessation of work occurred in the metal industry. The majority of cases of cessation of work were described as strikes.

# CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND.

#### 1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; since 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6th, 1917, when Finland declared its independence. It became a republic in 1919. The Diet together with the President possess the legislative power of the country. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage.

The proportions of the different parties in the Diet elected on the 1st. and 2nd April are as follows:

#### 2. LAND.

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE in the coldest month is in S. W. Finland —  $5^{\circ}$  to —  $6^{\circ}$  C., in Lappland —  $15^{\circ}$  C. and during the warmest month  $+15^{\circ}$  and  $+13^{\circ}$  to  $+14^{\circ}$  C. resp. The average temperature in Helsingfors is  $+4.6^{\circ}$  (in Christiania  $+5.5^{\circ}$ , in London  $+9.9^{\circ}$ , in Montreal  $+5.5^{\circ}$ , in Chicago  $+9.1^{\circ}$ , in Vladivostock  $+4.4^{\circ}$ , in Moscow  $+3.6^{\circ}$ ). The ground is covered with snow in the South during about 100 days, in Central Finland during 150 to 180 days, in Lappland about 210 days.

THE AREA (the new province of Petsamo included) is 387, 565 square kilometres (= 149, 651 square miles, Great Britain's area is 89,047 sq. m. and Italy's area 110,632 sq. m.). Of the total area 343,279 sq. km. (88.6%) consist of land, while 44,286 sq. km. (11.4%) are lakes. On an average 10.8% of the land in the south of Finland is cultivated, 0.8% in the North, 6.1% of the whole land.

#### 3. POPULATION.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1922): 3.4 millions, of which 0.2 million emigrants, [in Sweden (1921) 6.0, in Switzerland (1920) 3.9, in Denmark (1921) 3.3 and in Norway (1920) 2.6 millions].

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1920): In South-Finland 17.2, in North-Finland 2.3 and in the whole country an average of 10.1 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

LANGUAGE (1920): Finnish speaking 89%. Swedish

LANGUAGE (1920): Finnish speaking 89 %, Swedish speaking 11 %.

RELIGION (1920): Lutheran 98 %, Greek-Orthodox 2 %.

DISTRIBUTION (1922): 83.9 % of the population inhabit the country, 16.1 % the towns. The largest towns are (1922): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 201,435 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 59,457, Tampere (Tammerfors) 49,398, Viipuri (Viborg) 31,353.

EDUCATION (1920): Amongst persons over 15 years of age only 0.8% are illiterate. Three universities founded 1640, 1917 and 1920.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1922): Births 23.4  $^{\circ}$ /<sub>00</sub>, deaths 14.4  $^{\circ}$ /<sub>00</sub> (in France in 1919 15.0  $^{\circ}$ /<sub>00</sub>, and in England in 1920 12.4  $^{\circ}$ /<sub>00</sub>), natural increase 9.0  $^{\circ}$ /<sub>00</sub>.

#### 4. INDUSTRIAL AND BUSINESS CONDITIONS.

PROPORTIONS OF OCCUPATIONS OF THE POPULATION (1920): agriculture 65.1  $^{\circ}/_{o}$ , industry and manual labour 14.8  $^{\circ}/_{o}$ , commerce 3.4  $^{\circ}/_{o}$ , other occupations 17.7  $^{\circ}/_{o}$ .

AGRICULTURE (1920): Cultivated land 2.0 million hectars, divided as follows: area under cultivation 0.5—10 hectars 33.8°/0, 10—50 ha. 48.9°/0, 50—100 ha 9.8°/0, over 100 ha. 8.0°/0. The above mentioned surface of cultivated land was divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 45.8°/0 hay, 19.6°/0 oats, 11.2°/0 rye, 5.8°/0 barley, 3.5°/0 potatoes, 14.1°/0 other. The number of dairies in 1920 amounted to 455.

INDUSTRY (1922): Number of industrial concerns 3,294, hands 132,842, gross value of products of industry 8,085.4 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1924): 4,527 km., of which 4,231 km. State railways and 296 km. private. The gauge is 1.524 m.

COMMERCIAL FLEET (1922): Sailing ships 646 (94,757 reg. tons net.) steamships 636 (88,319 r. t.), motor boats 125 (16,990 r. t.), lighters 3,284 (267,271 r. t.). Total 4,691 (467,337 r. t.).

FINANCES: Since 1860 the currency unit is the Finnmark (= 100 pennies) = 1 French franc. The redemption of bank notes in gold was cancelled on April 15th, 1915.

THE CENTRAL BANK. The Bank of Finland, (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head-office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vasa), Oulu (Uleåborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Sortavala, Viipuri (Viborg), Mikkeli (S:t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä and Kotka.

THE JOINT STOCK BANKS (1923): Number 21, possess 412 branch offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. Including all banks, there is one banking establishment per 7,700 inhabitants.

THE SAVINGS BANKS (1923): Number at the end of the year 467.

# THE WATER POWER PLANT AT IMATRA.



# EMPLOYMENT OF WATER POWER IN FINLAND.

The available power in the rapids of Finland amounts to about 2.5 million H. P. Not more than 8% of this has been harnessed hitherto. This low percentage is, however, not due to any lack in the demand for power. The need of power for the industry of the country has, indeed, grown during the two last decades on an average by 15,000 H. P. a year and has now reached about 450,000 H. P. At least half of this is supplied by caloric power, the timber supplies of the country and imported coal being used as fuel. One of the reasons, which has contributed to the fact that only a comparatively small part of the rapids has, up to date, been utilised, is that the advantageous rapids of the chief rivers of Finland are too great to be exploited for local use or by private effort and the steps taken by the Government for the utilisation of water power have therefore been only natural and desirable from the point of view of economic advance. It is true that the Government had for a long time owned rapids in the country, but only since the country became independent has the Government of fixed purpose completed and increased its property in this respect instituting at the same time a special office in order to organise and carry out their utilisation. start was made by beginning to build out the famous rapids of Imatra in the Vuoksi river.

# THE SAIMAA WATER SYSTEM.

The greater part of East-Finland (see map) forms one water system, which has an area of about 60,000 square kilometres, thus being almost as large as Belgium and Holland together or a good deal larger than the states of New Jersey. Massachussets and Connecticut together. All the waters of this area, passing through numerous smaller lakes, empty into Lake Saimaa. From Saimaa the surface of which is about 5,000 square kilometres and which lies about 76 metres above sea level the waters flow through the Vuoksi river into lake Ladoga, which is 5 metres above sea level. Economically the most important part of this river is the so-called Upper Vuoksi or the first 27 kilometres from its source at Saimaa. In this part there are several great rapids, the fall of which attains 64.24 metres altogether and through which 480 cubic metres of water pass per second during the time of low-water, 570 cubic metres during mean water and 670 cubic metres during the flood-tides generally. The extreme limits of the flowing water are 350 and 1,200 cubic metres a second. By using the great water basin of Saimaa as an accumulator, that is to say, by regulating the quantity of water passing the power plants of Vuoksi according to need, it is possible greatly to increase the energetic efficacy of the Vuoksi river. In this way the Upper Vuoksi, fully built out, would supply about 700,000 turbine H. P. At present only




about 14,000 H. P. have been built out in the Vuoksi river.

# THE PROPOSED WATER POWER PLANT AT IMATRA.

Imatra, belonging to the Government, is the greatest and most advantageous of the Vuoksi rapids and the Government has now begun to build it out. The Government bought, in 1921, the smaller rapids above Imatra as well as the private property along the banks necessary for the scheme. In: 1922 the work was started according to a plan, the leading features of which are seen in the accompanying drawing. Above the Imatra rapids a regulation dam will be built, by which the water level above the rapids will be raised, so that a net head of 23 metres in the power plant will be attained. The intention is ultimately to raise the water level on the upper river by one metre more, whereby the net head in the power plant will be 24 metres. Through this rasing of the water level the energy of the small rapids above will be joined to that of Imatra, and a basin of 4 kilometres in length will be formed about the power plant. On account of the raising of the water level embankments have to be built for some distance on both banks, so that the lake thus

formed may not spread over the land, which is now usefully employed. From above the dam the water is led through a 500 metre long upper canal to the power plant and from there again to its natural bed through a tailrace of the same length. The machine-room will from the beginning be prepared for 4 aggregates, but at first only three machine aggregates will be installed. In its first phase the motive power to be built out will amount to about 79,000 turbine H. P., which corresponds to about 55,000 high-tension The cost of building out the first building phase is estimated at 3,090 Finnmarks (77.25 dollars) to each built out high-tension kilowatt. The first building phase is intended to be completed before 1928. The power plant constructed in this way may in the future at comparatively small additional cost be enlarged, so that, after regulating the water level of Saimaa, 150,000 high-tension kilowatts will be attained from eight aggregates, whereby the cost of building out decreases to about 2,200 marks (55 dollars) a kilowatt. The building out of the plant will be made in phases according to the growing need for energy in Finland. In the same way the other rapids of the Vuoksi and the rapids, that the Government owns in other parts of Finland, will be harnessed in the future.



#### POWER TRANSMISSION.

As is seen on the accompanying map the intention is first to transfer power by wire on the lines Imatra—Wiborg, Imatra-Lappeenranta -Kouvola-Riihimäki-Helsingfors-Karis and Riihimäki Forssa-Åbo. In this way the power from Imatra will be used in a great part of South-Finland, where the need for power is greatest. Nearly half the population of Finland and about 80 % of its town population live in the part of the country lying south of a line drawn due west from Sortavala to the Gulf of Bothnia. This area also contains nearly half the cultivated land of the country and more than 70 % of its industry. At present, too, the power from Imatra might with advantage be substituted for a very considerable amount of the steam power used in the district. If the demand for power should increase only in the same proportion as in the period since 1902, an additional water power of about 80,000 H. P. would be needed in this area in 1930 and about 115.000 H. P. in 1935. Nevertheless it should be noted that this calculation does not cover such power demand as for the electrification of new railway sections or for such new enterprises, as the supply of power could make possible.

These lines for power transmission erected in conjunction with the building out of Imatra, will later on be completed, so as to form a connecting line between the greatest power plants of the southern part of the country and make possible their mutual co-operation.

# THE COSTS OF IMATRA WATER POWER PLANT.

According to calculations made the cost of the power plant itself and the power transmission in the first building phase are as follows:




So far, that is to say in 1921—1924, a total of 72 million marks of Government means, chiefly obtained by taxation, has been used for this enterprise. For the period 1925—1928 consequently 258 million marks are still needed.


# THE ECONOMIC IMPORTANCE OF THE BUILDING OUT OF IMATRA.


Imatra, when built out, will considerably increase the economic power of Finland. The greatest wealth of Finland is contained in its forests, the value of which has increased decade after decade with the rise in the price of woodgoods. Energetic efforts are also being made for the improvement of forestry and the use of


forest products. But one of the most important features in this respect is that the home consumption of fuel, especially for industry and the railways, should be decreased. In this respect the power to be obtained from Imatra brings about a considerable saving, as it can be substituted for both home wood and foreign coal. It is also likely that the supply of sufficient motive power will also stimulate the development of wood-refining and the pulp and paper industries. In the same way, too, ther industries, agriculture and cottage industries will undoubtedly profit by this power transmission. The electrification of part of the railways is also, of course, one of the productive consequences of the Imatra enterprise.











# CURRENT BANK OF FINLAND NOTES.

Since the Bank of Finland has recently received numerous inquiries, as to what banknotes are still legal tender, it may be stated that all authentic notes issued by the Bank of Finland since its foundation in 1811 are still legal tender in Finland. The counterfeit notes alone are, naturally, not accepted by the Bank of Finland. When the Bank of Finland, by means of a circular letter distributed with the March number of the Bulletin, advised foreign banks only to accept Finnish notes of the 1922 type, this was because forged Finnish notes of earlier issues than 1922 are in circulation abroad causing losses to the banks which accept them. There are two kinds of such forged notes:

1) Of the 1909 type the following notes and numbers which were stolen from the Bank during the war:

500 mark (Orange) N:o. 170,001/ 262,000 100 ,, (Violet) ,, 2,775,001/ 2,983,000 20 mark (Orange) N:o. 9,874,001/10,019,000 5 ,, (Blue) ,, 19,397,001/20,789,000

Since, however, these counterfeit notes are at present often given a lower number by erasure and forgery, it is difficult by means of their numbers to discriminate between them and the authentic ones.

2) The 1,000 mark notes of the 1918 type which were put into circulation in St. Petersburg in December 1923 and which are so well counterfeited that they are very difficult to distinguish from the real ones.

Since the Bank's new 1922 notes have now been put into circulation in such numbers that they fully meet the entire demand for notes, the Bank has advised the public and the banks at home and abroad to exchange notes of the old type for the new ones, which are reproduced in the circular letter distributed as a supplement to No. 3 of the Bulletin.

# ITEMS.

Coming presidential election. The present President of the Republic, professor of law, late president of the Supreme Court of Administration, K. J. Ståhlberg, whose six years' term expires on March 1st, 1925, has announced that he does not wish to accept nomination as a candidate for the coming presidential election.

The election of a president is made by electors chosen by general suffirage and numbering 300. The choice of electors is to be made on January 15th and 16th and the election of the president will be held on February 15th, 1925.

Assembly of the Diet. The new Diet, elected on April 1st and 2nd, met on May 1st. The late

Prime Minister K. Kallio, a member of the Agrarian party, was elected Speaker. Dr. P. Virkkunen, who was chosen as first Deputy Speaker, is a Unionist, while the late Senator V. Vuolijoki, who was elected Second Deputy Speaker, is a Social-Democrat.

Proposed reduction of taxes. The Government has laid a proposal before the Diet that certain of the comparatively unproductive and out-of-date land taxes (some of them dating back to the XVIIth century) should be abolished. The revenue from these taxes amounts in all to about 19 million marks (475,000 dollars).

The income and property taxes, which are considered by the business world to be very heavy, are, according to the Government's proposals, also to be reduced. The revenue from these taxes which at present amounts to about 440 million marks (11 million dollars), would be reduced by the proposed alterations by about 100—115 million marks (2.5—2.9 million dollars).

These reductions in taxation are considered necessary, partly owing to the prevailing shortage of capital in Finland, partly owing to the good state of the Government finances.

Government guarantee for municipal loans. The Diet has resolved that, in case municipalities form a consortium for the purpose of taking up one or more loans in bonds to a total amount not exceeding 300 million marks, or a corresponding sum in foreign currency, the State might be prepared to guarantee such loans, on certain conditions concerning the mutual responsibility of the municipalities.

National Debt. The National Debt was reduced during April by 17.3 million marks. That the Debt, expressed in dollars, nevertheless shows an increase of 2.1 million dollars, is due principally to the appreciable increase in the rate of exchange for frames.

Finland's participation in the Milan Exhibition. Finland was represented in the recent exhibition in Milan. The Finnish pavilion which contained samples of the products of Finnish industry and cottage industry, aroused great interest at the exhibition.

Aerial communication between Finland and other countries. One Finnish and several foreign air-traffic companies, chiefly Baltic, have for some time carried on negotiations with regard to starting regular air traffic along the routes Hel-

singfors—Reval—Königsberg and Helsingfors—Stockholm. Already earlier communication by air had been kept up between Helsingfors and Reval and from May 15th this traffic is to be restarted, this time in combination with the route Reval—Königsberg. Later, at a date not yet fixed, air traffic is to be started on the route Helsingfors—Stockholm.

Amalgamation of the Suomen Kauppapankki with the Helsingfors Aktiebank. The decision with regard to the absorption of the Suomen Kauppapankki by the Helsingfors Aktiebank has been referred to by us before. On May 1st Suomen Kauppapankki ceased to transact business and its operations were taken over by the Helsingfors Aktiebank. By this large acquisition the Helsingfors Bank receives no less than twelve new branch offices, among them the Kauppapankki's head office in Wiborg.

Abortive scheme for bank amalgamation. In our last issue we stated that the Boards of Directors concerned had come to a preliminary agreement with regard to the absorption of the Unionbanken i Finland by the Helsingfors Aktiebank. In the preparatory work, however, for closing the books, which had been stipulated for among the conditions of amalgamation, certain difficulties arose. These difficulties were of such a nature that the management of the Unionbanken i Finland could no longer see their way to recommending the amalgamation. As a great part of the shareholders in the Unionbanken took up the same standpoint as the management of the bank in the dispute which grose, the amalgamation has been abandoned.

As, however, the position of the Unionbanken calls for measures of improvement, a reconstruction of the bank is proposed. According to the new scheme the share capital of the reorganised bank is to be 100 million marks, of which 40 million marks are to be issued as fresh capital,

while the Unionbanken's present assets are to be included in the share capital at a valuation of 60 millions, the remainder being used partly for forming a reserve fund and partly for writing off bad debts and depreciated assets.

The Bank of Finland has taken up a favourable position towards this scheme.

Finnish journalists invited to Holland. A number (about 10—15) representatives of the Finnish press have been invited by friends of Finland in Holland to visit that country about August 5th in order to study Dutch conditions on the spot.

Shipping. By the middle of May the ice had disappeared to such an extent that navigation was open to all ports in the Gulf of Finland and in the Gulf of Bothnia as far north as Wasa.

Great gifts for educational purposes. The widow of the late Consul von Rettig, Mrs Anna von Rettig, has presented 5 million marks (125,000 dollars) to Åbo Academy for founding a chair of theology, and the firm of P. C. Rettig & Co. 3 million marks (75,000 dollars) to Åbo Finnish University for a professorship in historic archaeology.
