THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW

TIMBER SALES AND CUTTING

The forest industry working again at full capacity, the timber market has been characterized by increasing activity and rising prices. The outcome of stumpage price movements is not yet quite clear, but on the average the prices are estimated to have increased by 10—15 per cent above the level of autumn 1953. In individual cases still higher prices are recorded, especially in southern and south-eastern Finland. Owing to rises in the forest workers' wages, the prices of raw timber delivered to the mills have risen somewhat more.

During the last few weeks raw timber deals have tended to slacken, especially in southern Finland. This is hardly to be regarded as a sign that buyers have satisfied their need but rather displays a certain restraint calculated to check further price increases. On the other hand sellers also seem to be playing a waiting game, for in their opinion the exporting industries have not yet bought enough.

During the current season, which started in June, cutting got more rapidly under way than last year and the number of forest workers was higher all autumn. According to preliminary estimates about 85,000 persons were engaged in forest work at the end of November, or about as many as in the peak autumn of 1951. By the end of October cuts exceeded 6.4 mill. cu. m piled measure, which is 0.3 mill. cu. m more than at the corresponding date in 1951, when the former maximum was reached, and some 20 per cent more than last year. As usual at this time of the year the greater part consisted of

piled round timber, of which 4.1 mill. cu. m had been cut, or 60 per cent more than a year before. As for other kinds of wood, cuts of heavy broad-leaved timber for plywood increased by 30 per cent, while cuts of fuel wood decreased by 44 per cent. Cuts of saw logs proper are not yet in full swing, but they too are expected to be at least as extensive as last year.

Thanks to brisk activity in the forests and in other spheres of the economy, the rate of employment is high for the time of year. The regular winter unemployment set in later than usual. Up to October 27, not quite 7,000 persons were entered on the unemployment registers as against more than 34,000 persons at the corresponding date last year. Thus unemployment is expected during the coming winter to be restricted to the usual seasonal unemployment, which is conditioned by climatic factors.

BUILDING ACTIVITY

Figures for the third quarter indicate a powerful rise in building activity. The 7.02 mill cu m of buildings completed during July—September constitute a rise of 11 per cent as compared with the 1953 figure, and the total for the first nine months, 13.12 mill cu m, is 10 per cent higher than last year. The cubic content of buildings under construction at the end of September exceeds the corresponding figure for 1953 by about 3 per cent.

There are, so far, no signs of slackening of the building activity. Building licences issued during the third quarter cover a total of 5.83 mill. cu. m, which is 21 per cent more

than in July—September last year. This. together with the high sales figures for staple building materials, indicates the continuance of the present building boom. In addition, the Government programme outlined in the previous Market Review includes a couple of issues which, no doubt, will give a further impetus to the trade in question. Of these, the abolition of the sales tax on sawn timber used for building purposes has already been enacted by the Diet. measure is calculated to ease the tax burden by some 1.500 million marks a year. further 2,500 million tax reduction is to follow if the Diet passes the Government proposal involving partial refunds of the sales tax levied on dwelling construction (the proposal covers housing starts during October 31, 1954—Januari 1, 1957).

The shift from rural towards urban districts that made itself felt during the first half of the year continued in the third quarter. Of the buildings completed in July -September, 40 per cent were in urban districts, as compared with 37 per cent in 1953. The shift is still more clearly visible in the statistics on buildings under construction and licences granted. Accordingly, the relative share of dwelling houses, industrial and commercial buildings, and office buildings has grown at the cost of agricultural buildings. A natural outcome of this development is the growth in the relative share of stone buildings at the cost of wooden houses. This accounts for the fact that while the volume of building in 1954 is preliminarily estimated to exceed the 1953 figure by some 5 per cent, its value will probably rise 2 per cent more, i. e. by 7 per cent. It remains to be seen to what extent the present tendencies will be affected by the fact that the abolition of the sales tax on sawn timber favours the use of timber as building material and thus building in rural districts.

AGRICULTURE

The current year's crop is estimated to have remained 4.5 per cent smaller than in 1953. Bread grain forms the only notable exception to the general picture, the output of it having risen slightly. This, however, was due to an increase in the area under

grain, for the average yield per hectare remained unchanged. A particularly small crop of inferior quality was recorded in the case of potatoes and fodder plants.

The abnormally abundant rainfall, which accounts for the unsatisfactory crops, has also affected cattlefarming. The notable rise in milk output early in the year, as compared with the normal seasonal level, slackened down during the summer months, and a further drop is to be expected owing to the poor fodder crop. As for butter, the quantities delivered to the Butter Trade Association in October and November were 8 per cent less than last year.

Meat production, on the other hand, has been considerably larger than in 1953. Up to the end of September, 19 per cent more meat had been put on the market than during the corresponding period last year. The production of pork in particular grew very much. To prevent an abrupt price fall, exports of about 4,000 tons of pork were subsidized up to the end of October.

Simultaneously with the drop in the output of dairy produce, consumption has grown as consumer prices have been lowered by subsidies. The considerable overproduction of butter during the first few months of the year caused storage difficulties, which could only be overcome by means of exports. After the reduction of the price of butter from the beginning of November the increasing consumption began rapidly to diminish stocks.

In the autumn agricultural income was calculated to be lagging 4-5 per cent behind the general wage level (see previous Market Review). In accordance with the present legislation this caused some increases in producer prices. Thus, prices of rye, wheat, milk and potatoes were raised somewhat. The prices of pork and eggs were reduced, but as the prices determined on the basis of the previous agricultural income calculation had not been effective in practice, there will probably be no actual reduction. Prices of eggs and pork are not controlled but are regulated by influencing the domestic supply and demand situation through exports.

CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND

1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; from 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The legislative power of the country is vested in the Diet and the President. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The President for the current period, March 1, 1950, to March 1, 1956, is Juho Kusti Paasikivi who has been in office since March 11, 1946.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The number of seats of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1954 are as follows: Social Democrats 54, Agrarians 53, People's Democrats 43, Conservatives 24, Swedish Party 13, Finnish People's Party (former Liberal Party) 13.

2. LAND

THE AREA is 337,009 square kilometres (Great Britain's area is 245,000 sq. km and Italy's area 301,000 sq. km). Of the total area 9.4 % are inland waters. On an average 14.4 % of the land in the South of Finland is cultivated (1949), 2.0 % in the North, 8.2 % of the whole land. Of the land area 21.7 mill. ha (53.5 mill. acres) or 70.9 % are covered by forests.

3. POPULATION

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1953): 4.1 millions. Sweden (1952) 7.1, Switzerland (1953) 4.8, Denmark (1952) 4.3 and Norway (1952) 3.3 millions.

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1953): In South Finland 23.4, in North Finland 3.7 and in the whole country an average of 13.7 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

DISTRIBUTION (1953): 66.8 % of the population inhabit the country, 33.2 % the towns and market towns. The largest towns are (1953): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital 394,500 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 106,800, Tampere (Tammerfors) 105.000.

OCCUPATION (1950): Agriculture and forestry 42 %, industry 29 %, commerce 7 %, transport and communication 6 %, services 9 %, other economically active persons 1 %, economically inactive persons 6 %.

LANGUAGE (1950): Finnish speaking 91.1 %, Swedish speaking 8.6 %, others 0.3 %.

EDUCATION (1952): Practically all persons over 15 years of age are literate. There are three universities (the oldest founded in 1640) and 12 colleges of university standard.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1952); Births 23.0 °/00, deaths 9.5 °/00, increase 12.8 °/00. Deaths in France (1952) 12.3 °/00 and in Great Britain (1952) 11.4 °/00.

4. TRADE AND COMMUNICATIONS

NATIONAL INCOME (1952, in thousand million marks): Gross national income at market price 793. Net national product at factor cost, by origin: agriculture 80 (13%), forestry and fishing 77 (13%), manufacturing 191 (31%), construction 56 (9%), transport and communications 44 (7%), commerce, banking and insurance 76 (12%), public activities 55 (9%), other services 31 (5%), total 610. Volume index 120 (1948 = 100).

FOREST RESOURCES (1950): The growing stock comprises 1,370 million of solid cub, m. incl. bark (48,384 million cub. ft), of which pine is 45.5%, spruce 32.2%, the rest 22.3% being leaf-trees, chiefly birch. Of the growing stock 7,471 million cub. ft, 65.0% of them pines, are up to the standard required for logs (minimum for sawmill logs $18'\times6''$ and for veneer logs $18'\times7''$). The annual growth is about 41 million of solid cub. m. green wood excl. bark (1,448 mill. cub. ft). The

total removal in 1949 calculated according to the use of wood was 40 million cub. m. (1,413 million cub. ft). In the years 1923 to 1938 in the then area of the country, it averaged 41 million cub. m. (1,448 million cub. ft) per year, the corresponding yearly growth being 46 million cub. m. (1,624 million cub. ft).

AGRICULTURE (1950): Cultivated land 2.5 million hectares, divided as follows: area under cultivation under 10 hectares 41.2 %, 10—50 ha 53.6 %, 50—100 ha 3.6 %, over 100 ha 1.6 %. Cultivated land (1953) is divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 43.4 % hay, 7.7 % temporary grassland for grazing, 19.0 % oats, 5.0 % wheat, 3.7 % rye, 6.7 % barley, 3.7 % potatoes, 10.8 % others. Dairy units in operation in 1953 amount to 459.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND (1950): The land area is distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 56.9%, State 35.0%, joint stock companies etc. 6.4%, communities 1.7%.

INDUSTRY (1952): Number of industrial concerns 5,994, workpeople 270,453, gross value of products of industry 508,355 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1954): 5,046 km, of which 4,859 km State railways and 187 km private. The gauge is in general 1,524 m.

MERCHANT FLEET (1. 4. 1954): Steamers 327 (419,890 gross reg. tons), motor vessels 145 (236,320 gross reg. tons), sailing vessels with auxiliary engines 124 (11,797 gross reg. tons). Total 596 (668,007 gross reg. tons).

5. FINANCE AND BANKING

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to 1914 the currency maintained its stable gold value, and after the disturbances caused by the war a gold standard was again introduced from January 1, 1926. The unit currency is the mark (Finnish markka» = 100 pennia). Since October 12, 1931, the redemption of bank notes in gold is, however, suspended. In 1948 Finland joined the International Monetary Fund and on June 27, 1951, the official par value of the mark was established at 230 marks per one U. S. dollar, the selling rate of the Bank of Finland being 231 marks and its buying rate 229 marks.

STATE FINANCES. According to the finance accounts for 1953 the State revenue was 223,795 million marks, of which 185,969 million marks were current revenue, and State expenditure 221,167 million marks, of which 141,943 million marks were current expenditure. See tables 21—23 in this issue,

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the finance accounts for 1952 expenditure amounted to 98,483 million marks. Total revenue was 100,367 million marks, of which income from taxation was 57,395 million marks. The municipal income tax (non-progressive) averaged 10.9 % of the ratepayers income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vasa), Oulu (Uleåborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Mikkeli (S:t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus). Jyväskylä, Kotka and Lahti.

THE COMMERCIAL BANKS (1954): Number 6, possess 511 offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. There is one banking establishment per 8,200 inhabitants.

The largest banks are Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Oy Pohjois-maiden Yhdyspankki — Ab Nordiska Föreningsbanken and Helsingin Osakepankki — Helsingfors Aktiebank, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1954): Mortgage Banks 5, Savings banks 431, Co-operative Credit Societies 604 and a Central Bank for the latter.

FINNISH AIR TRANSPORT

GENERAL MANAGER OF THE FINNAIR

A look at the geographical position of Finland on the map of Europe shows the comparatively large size of the country and its remoteness from the European centres. The need for rapid means of communication owing to the great distances has created favourable conditions for air traffic.

European air transport started in the early 1920's, and the network of communications was extended to Finland as early as At that time an Estonian airline worked regularly between Tallinna and Helsinki. In 1920-1923 attempts were made to establish air transport from Sweden to Helsinki, but the traffic was discontinued before long. On November 1, 1923, the Finnish company Aero Oy, now better known abroad as FINNAIR, was established. At that time hydroplanes were used extensively and in a country like Finland, with its abundance of waterways, the lakes were suitable places for taking off and coming down. Airfields were almost non-existent in Finland, nor was the position in the neighbouring countries any better.

The FINNAIR started its operations, quite naturally, within a very modest framework. To begin with, the company had only one 4-seater hydroplane, a German Junkers F 13, that was put on the route Helsinki—Tallinna (the capital of Estonia) in March 1924. Three months later, another route was opened between Helsinki and Stockholm in cooperation with the Swedish company AB Aerotransport. The total of passengers flown during the first year amounted to 269. From this very low figure the yearly results


grew steadily, and simultaneously with this development the equipment was expanded and renewed.

As traffic requirements increased, Finnish air transport was extended, supported by annual Government grants. In view of the rapid technical advance in air transport, Government assistance was particularly necessary.

In order to estimate the comparative extent of the assistance given by the Government for maintaining air transport, it should naturally be compared with the Government aid in other countries. In "Economics of Air Transport in Europe", published by the League of Nations in 1935, the conclusion is drawn, on the basis of certain calculations, that the grants for air transport made by the Finnish Government were the smallest in Europe.

A remarkable step forwards was taken in 1936, when the airport Helsinki was completed and a change could be made from the hydroplane station to the new airfield. The company now started traffic with two De Havilland 89 planes. In the following year air transport inside the country was initiated on two routes: Helsinki—Viipuri and Helsinki—Tampere. At that time traffic had grown relatively extensive, the results for 1937 being: 312,000 km flown, 7,200 passengers carried, 94 tons of luggage, 31 tons of mails and 27 tons of freight.

Before the outbreak of the Second World War finnain's longest foreign route was Helsinki — Tallinna — Riga — Königsberg — Danzig—Berlin, and inside the country Hel-



sinki—Tampere—Vaasa—Kokkola — Oulu — Kemi. In 1939 the figures for air transport were the following: 609,300 km flown, 12,700 passengers carried, 167 tons of luggage, 102 tons of mails and 68 tons of freight.

The subsequent war years created great difficulties for Finnish air transport, but even then traffic was maintained very satisfactorily in the circumstances. Air transport is considered to have returned into peace channels at the beginning of 1947, when the equipment was entirely renewed and the air routes were replanned. Great changes had also occurred in the internal structure of the company, the Government having invested

public funds to raise the capital, so that FINNAIR became State-controlled. Since then 73 per cent of the share capital have been held by the State.

In renewing the equipment the machine selected was the Douglas DC-3, of which eight were bought from the Army Stores of the Allies and converted into civil transport planes. Both the foreign and internal air routes were reorganized. Of the foreign centres only Stockholm was flown to at first; in 1948, the route was prolonged to Copenhagen, and later to Amsterdam, this terminus being exchanged on April 15, 1951, to Düsseldorf (via Hamburg). The internal air

lines were extended as the new routes and airfields were adapted or new airfields were built.

In 1949, KARHUMÄKI AIRWAYS embarked upon regular transport along some internal routes. Its parent company, Veljekset Karhumäki Oy, which was established in 1924, had at first confined itself to building aeroplanes and carrying out repairs, to chartered flights, air photography, training, advertising and ore prospecting, but now engaged also in regular air transport on a couple of routes, mostly during the summer.

The following figures illustrate the growth of traffic in 1947—1951:

According to these figures, there was a considerable increase in the number of passengers on the foreign routes in 1948, this being due mainly to the extension of the routes. This continued in the following years. The number of passengers on the internal routes also grew owing to the greater frequency of flights and the introduction of new routes.

In 1952 experiments were made on some internal routes at lower rates, while at the same time the seating accommodation of the planes was increased. The experiments proved very satisfactory.

The experience gained in foreign traffic showed that the Douglas DC-3, owing to the rapid development of aeroplanes, no longer satisfied the demands made nowadays on types of machines for air journeys of medium length. The finnam therefore proceed ed to look for a type that was suitable to this purpose and decided on the 44-seater Convair 340. In April 1953 the first Convair was put into the foreign service, followed by others at the beginning of the summer season. In this way it was possible to cater better for traffic with suitable planes,

and to increase rapid communications between Finland and other European countries. The latest extensions of the FINNAIR routes were made on October 4, 1953, when flights were started from Düsseldorf to Paris, and on September 1, 1954, from Düsseldorf to London on certain days. Finland has thus obtained two important air connections with the large European centres.

When summer traffic began in April 1953, the prices of all internal air tickets were lowered by 20 per cent. The low fares — 3 pence per mile — have made flying in Finland a very popular form of transport. This is indicated by the following statistics:

This development has continued in 1954, and for January—October the FINNAIR figures are as follows: on internal routes 105,650 passengers which constitutes an increase of 48.5 per cent as compared with the corresponding figure for last year, 71,146, and on foreign routes 57,855 (52,641), an increase of 9.9 per cent, or a total of 163,505 (123,787), an increase of 32.1 per cent.

The great work of reconstruction in Finland since the war, the expansion of the engineering and woodworking industries and the plans for building new power stations, especially in Northern Finland, have necessitated better means of communication. At present the FINNAIR makes flights to ten and the karhumäki AIRWAYS three towns. On most of the routes there are two flights daily. Many of the air routes pass over the most beautiful lake districts of Finland and are therefore popular in summer, especially among foreign tourists. The longest internal air route extends from Helsinki to Rovaniemi on the Arctic Circle.

The airways of finnair are as follows: Helsinki—Kuopio, Helsinki—Jyväskylä— Kuopio—Joensuu, Helsinki—Oulu—Kemi— Rovaniemi, Helsinki—Vaasa, Helsinki—Vaasa —Oulu—Kemi—Rovaniemi, Helsinki—Pori, Helsinki—Pori—Vaasa, Helsinki—Turku— Mariehamn, Pori — Turku — Mariehamn — Stockholm, Helsinki—Stockholm, Helsinki— Copenhagen—Düsseldorf—Paris or London.

The FINNAIR equipment consists at present of nine Douglas DC-3 26-seaters and three Convair 340 44-seaters, the total seating accommodation being 366. The company's staff consists of 690, of whom 72 belong to the flying department.

In 1954 KARHUMÄKI AIRWAYS extended their network and also introduced winter traffic on the routes Helsinki—Joensuu and Helsinki—Tampere—Stockholm. The company has three Douglas DC-3 24-seater planes at its disposal.

Except the above mentioned two companies engaged in regular traffic, there are several

small air transport enterprises, besides which a few private persons, the State, and some industrial firms have planes of their own. At the beginning of 1954 altogether 83 planes were registered in addition to the 15 planes of the finnair and karhumäki airways. In 1939 finnair had 4 planes, while the number of other planes was 21.

In accordance with international agreements foreign companies also make flights to Finland. The number of passengers carried by foreign planes to and from Finland during the last five years was about 70 per cent of the total of passengers on the foreign routes of finnair. In 1953 finnair transported 70,770 passengers on foreign routes as compared with 42,107 passengers carried by foreign companies to and from Finland.

ITEMS

Trade Agreements. A trade and payments agreement for 1955 was concluded between Finland and the Democratic Republic of Germany on November 19, 1954. Finnish exports are estimated at \$18 million and imports at \$20 million. The difference will be covered, as usual, by triangular settlements. Finnish exports are to include cheese, wood and paper products, round timber, and ilmenite. Finnish imports will include sodium sulphate, potash fertilizers, chemicals, optical products, and machinery and apparatus.

Passport Regulations. Finland has recently concluded agreements with a number of countries according to which no visa will be required of the nationals of these countries travelling to Finland and vice versa, except for a stay exceeding three months. The countries are as follows: Italy (as from August 1, 1954), San Marino (Sept. 1, 1954), Turkey (Oct. 29, 1954), Austria and the Saar Territory (Dec. 1, 1954), and the United Kingdom (Dec. 16, 1954). Similar agreements have earlier been made with Iceland, Belgium, Netherlands, Luxembourg,

Switzerland, France, the Federal Republic of Germany, Greece, and Monaco. As to Sweden, Denmark and Norway, no passport either is required.

Lending Rates of the Bank of Finland. In order to enable the Bank of Finland to pursue a more flexible interest policy the Bank Supervisors of the Diet, at the suggestion of the Board of Management of the Bank, have decided to lower the minimum lending rate to 5 per cent and raise the maximum rate to $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent from the beginning of December. The former limits were 5 3/4 and 6 3/4 per cent respectively. This measure is intended to give the Bank a chance to vary its interest rates more adequately according to the duration and the purposes of the loans. It is to be expected that this wider range of differentiation will lead to a rise of the average level of interest rates applied by the Bank och Finland. This also means that the existing gap between the rates of the commercial banks and those of the Bank of Finland will become narrower than hitherto.
