# THE FINNISH MARKET REVIEW.

#### THE MONEY MARKET.

As usual, the month of May and the beginning of June were a difficult time for the banks. Business life, in spite of the stringency of the money market that has now lasted almost a year, was quite lively. This is indicated, for instance, by the growing exports and by the considerable imports of machinery and metals, intended to a great extent for the erection and rebuilding of industrial undertakings. However, in making a comparison with the year before it will be found that the seasonal stringency was less, owing principally to the fact that lumber work has been reduced to no small extent and that building operations were considerably less than last year's record figures.

The credits of the Joint Stock banks increased in May by 90.7 million marks which is fairly moderate compared with about 330 millions during the same month last year and over 200 millions in 1927. On the other hand deposits for last May show a decline of 61.3 million marks, whereas for the corresponding time in the two previous years there was an increase in the deposits of the Joint Stock banks amounting to about 100 and 30 million marks respectively. The difference between the credits and deposits of the banks was thus again appreciably increased in consequence, although not to the same extent as during the same month in the preceding years. The banks were therefore again obliged to increase their re-discounting at the Bank of Finland.

The position of the Joint Stock banks towards other countries is also marked by this stringency. As the banks again drew on their foreign balances and raised their indebtedness, their net indebtedness abroad grew in May by 45.7 million marks to 466.9 millions. A year earlier, when the stringency of the money market was just beginning, the corresponding indebtedness was 331.6 million marks.

In regard to the Bank of Finland chief attention is attracted by the reduction in the reserve of foreign currency, a phenomenon which is a regular one for this time of the year. The reduction in May amounted to 80.9 million marks compared with about 150 millions last year and 120 millions in 1927. The total credits of the Bank, which had dropped slightly in March and April, grew again in May by 38.6 millions owing principally to the fact that re-discounted bills increased by 31.8 millions and thus again reached 581.0 million marks. The notes in circulation were again reduced in May by 75.3 millions and amounted at the end of May to 1,480.9 million marks compared with 1,575.8 millions a year The note reserve was also reduced, so before. that it amounted to 342.4 million marks as against 208.7 millions at the end of last year.

During the first week in June the movement continued in the same direction as in May: the reserve of foreign currency was reduced by 9.6 million marks, while credits increased by 8.4 millions, of which re-discounts grew by 6.3 millions. On the other hand the note reserve rose again by 13.4 million marks to 355.8 millions.

The level of prices displays a falling tendency. The wholesale price index which fell 1 point in April, dropped as much again in May and consequently stands at 98 as against 103 a year ago. The cost of living index has dropped 9 points to 1,210 or to about the same level as a year ago.

#### TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

Foreign trade was very lively in May, seeing that both imports and exports exhibited new monthly records. The value of imports amounted to 819.3 million marks compared with 710.9 millions in April and 766.5 millions in the previous May. The value of exports amounted to 497.7 million marks compared with 368.9 millions in April and 489.9 millions in May, 1928. The surplus of imports for May was consequently 321.6 million marks, i. e. larger than for the corresponding month in previous years. This result appears not very satisfactory, but a closer examination of conditions shows that exports were quite satisfactory - establishing, for instance, fresh monthly records for butter and mechanical woodpulp --- while the heavy imports are due to the coincidence of several circumstances. It may be mentioned, for instance, that the imports of metals and machinery, intended for industrial purposes, were considerable, as also the imports of means of transport, thanks to the delivery of three new vessels. Besides, the imports of grain and sugar were considerable, while on the contrary the imports of textiles showed a falling tendency.

For the period January—May the value of imports amounted to 2,717.9 million marks, while the value of exports represented 1,553.4 millions. The former was therefore 340.8 million marks or 11.1 % less than last year's figures, while exports increased by 80.4 millions, equivalent to 5.5 %. In spite of this the balance of trade, which is always adverse at this time of year, provided a surplus of imports amounting to 1,164.5 million marks which, though 421.2 million marks less than at the same date last year, is rather above the normal.

Sales of sawn timber have proceeded normally. It is estimated that in May about 70,000 standards were sold and the total sales up to the end of May are calculated to be 730,000 stds in comparison with 700,000 stds at the same time last year. It should be mentioned in particular that 35,000 stds were bought for Great Britain last month. Unfortunately, prices are comparatively low. As lumber work has been restricted considerably - last winter's fellings of logs are estimated at 207 million English cubic feet as against 308 millions last year a change in the position of prices may be expected. The Board of the Finnish Sawmill Owners' Association has advised the owners of sawmills not to agree to any reductions in price.

The market for sulphite cellulose is satisfactory, but for sulphate cellulose on the other hand it is depressed, which is due to new undertakings having reduced prices in order to enter the market. Stocks are insignificant and the market for delivery in 1930 is normal as regards sulphite, while the sulphate market for next year has not yet opened.

#### THE LABOUR MARKET.

Owing to the late spring the usual improvement in labour conditions set in later than usual. The state of the labour market is in other respects, too, not as good as last year, when the demand for labourers was exceptionally large. The position can, nevertheless, be described as satisfactory.

26. - IMPORT-PRICE INDEX

The import- and export-indices have been calculated by the Statistical Dept. of the Board of Customs in the following manner: the quantities of imports and, respectively, exports for the current year have been multiplied by the average price for the class of goods in question in 1913, after which the import (or export) value for the current year has been calculated in percentage of the sum thus obtained for purposes of comparison. The goods chosen for the setting-up of a total-index have been divided, according to their use, into the groups: foodstuffs, cloth-ing, agricultural requirements and other goods. The three last-named have been further divided, according to their purpose, into raw materials, machinery and industrial products. The index is calculated by the Statistical Bureau of the Ministry of Social Affairs and is based on monthly reports from 21 different centres; it shows the rise in the cost of living for a workingman's family of normal size, the income of which amounted during the years 1908-1909 to 1600-2000 Fmk, assuming that the average monthly consumption within the same remained unaltered. The index for total cost of living is the average based on weight of the different indices.

#### **35.** — WHOLESALE PRICE INDEX.

The new wholesale price index is worked out at the Central Statistical Office. — The index is based on the quantity of goods in the local wholesale trade in Finland, the average price for 1926 being taken as a basis. There is no direct weighing of the data regarding prices, but indirect weighing has been carried out by each class of goods being represented by the number of commodities which corresponds to the calculated importance of the class in the wholesale trade. The averages are arithmetical averages.

## 37. - CESSATION OF WORK.

The above particulars which are of a preliminary nature, have been compiled by the Statistical Bureau of the Ministry of Social Affairs. The majority of cases of cessation of work were described as strikes.

# CERTAIN PARTICULARS ABOUT FINLAND.

#### 1. FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

Finland formed a part of the kingdom of Sweden from 1154 to 1809; since 1809 it was an autonomous Grand Duchy connected with Russia up to December 6th, 1917, when Finland declared its independence, which was acknowledged by all the Powers including Soviet Russia. It became a republic in 1919. The legislative power of the country is vested in the Diet and the President. The highest executive power is held by the President chosen for a period of 6 years. The present President L. Kr. Relander is elected for the term 1 March, 1925, to 1 March, 1931.

The Diet, composed of 200 members, is elected by universal suffrage. The proportions of the different parties in the Diet elected in 1927 are as follows:

#### 2. LAND.

THE ABEA is 383,279 square kilometres - 150,005 square miles, (Great Britain's area is 89,047 sq. m. and Italy's area 117,982 sq. m). Of the total area 11,5 % are lakes. On an average 10.8 % of the land in the south of Finland is cultivated, 0.9 % in the North, 6.8 % of the whole land. Of the land area 25.3 mill. ha (62.5 mill. acres) or 73.4 % are covered by forests.

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE in the coldest month is in S. W. Finland  $-5^{\circ}$  to  $-6^{\circ}$  C., in Lappland  $-15^{\circ}$  C. and during the warmest month  $+15^{\circ}$  and  $+13^{\circ}$  to  $+14^{\circ}$  C. resp. The average temperature in Helsinki is  $+4.6^{\circ}$  (in Oslo  $+5.4^{\circ}$ , in Montreal  $+5.4^{\circ}$ , in Moscow  $+3.6^{\circ}$ ). The ground is covered by snow in the South during about 100 days, in Central Finland during 150 to 180 days, in Lappland about 210 days.

#### 3. POPULATION.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS (1927): 3.6 millions, of which 0.3 million emigrants, (in Sweden (1927) 6.1, in Switzerland (1926) 4.0, in Denmark (1927) 3.5 and in Norway (1926) 2.8 millions).

DENSITY OF POPULATION (1927): In South-Finland 18.1, in North-Finland 2.4 and in the whole country an average of 10.4 inhabitants to the square kilometre.

LANGUAGE (1920); Finnish speaking 88.7 %, Swedish speaking 11.0 %, others 0.3 %.

**RELIGION** (1926): Lutheran 97.1 %, Greek-Orthodox 1.7 %, others 1.2 %.

DISTRIBUTION (1927): 80.0 % of the population inhabit the country, 20.0 % the towns and urban districts. The largest towns are (1927): Helsinki (Helsingfors), the capital, 220,904 inhabitants, Turku (Åbo) 62,599, Tampere (Tammerfors) 53,121, Vilpuri (Vilorg) 49,912.

EDUCATION (1920): Amongst persons over 15 years of age only 1.0 % are illiterate. Three universities founded 1640, 1917 and 1920.

INCREASE OF POPULATION (1927): Births 21.2  $^{9}_{00}$ , deaths 14.5  $^{9}_{00}$  (in France in 1925 17.6  $^{9}_{00}$ , and in England in 1925 12.2  $^{9}_{00}$ ), natural increase 6.7  $^{9}_{00}$ .

#### 4. INDUSTRY.

PROPORTIONS OF OCCUPATIONS OF THE POPULATION (1920): agriculture 65.1 %, industry and manual labour 14.8 %, commerce 3.4 %, other occupations 16.7 %.

OWNERSHIP OF LAND. The land area is distributed among different classes of owners approximately as follows: private 52.1 %, State 39.7 %, Joint Stock companies 6.5 %, communities 1.7 %.

FOREST RESOURCES. The growing stock of the forest is 1,620 million m<sup>6</sup> (57,213 million cubic feet). The merchantable timber (measuring 20 cm at breast height = 6 in. at a height of 18 ft.) amounts to 1,557 million trees. Of this number pine is represented by 61 %, spruce by 28 %, the conifers thus constarting 89 % or 1,384 million trees, leaftrees, mostly birch, 11 % or 173 million trees. The annual increment is 44.5 million m<sup>8</sup> (1,568 million cub.ft.). The annual fellings according to earlier calculations are 40 million m<sup>9</sup> (1,413 million cub. ft.). In North Finland the increment is much larger than the fellings, but in South Finland excess felling occurs locally.

AGRICULTURE. Cultivated land 2.1 million hectars, divided as follows: area under cultivation 0.4—10 hectars 38.7 %, 10—50 ha 48.9 %, 50—100 ha 9.3 %, over 100 ha 8.1 %. Cultivated land was divided between the different kinds of crops as follows: 46.8 % hay, 20.4 % cats, 11.1 % rye, 5.3 % barley, 8.2 % potates, 13.1 % other. The number of disiries in J926 amounted to 595.

INDUSTBY (1927): Number of industrial conserns 3,789, hands 159,141, gross value of products of industry 12,382 million marks.

LENGTH OF RAILWAYS (1927): 5,053 km, of which 4,787 km State railways and 266 km private. The gauge is 1.524 m.

COMMERCIAL FLEET (1929): Steam ships 529 (140;537 reg. tons net), motor vessels 182 (14,714 r. t.), sailing ships 377 (67,916 r. t.), lighters 3,992 (282,628 r. t.). Total 5,030 (505,795 r. t.).

#### 5. FINANCE AND BANKING.

CURRENCY. Since 1860 Finland has its own monetary system. From 1877 up to the Great War the currency maintained its stable gold value and after the disturbances caused by the war Finland has again from January 1st, 1926, a gold standard. The unit of currency is the mark (Finnish +markka+) = 100 pennies. The gold value of 100 marks is equal to  $2.5185 = \pounds$ . 10/4 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> d.

STATE FINANCES. According to the balance sheet for 1927 the State revenue was 3,986.1 million marks of which 3,907.9 million marks were ordinary revenue, and State expenditure 8,988.5 million marks, of which 3,329.3 million marks were ordinary expenditure. The principal sources of revenue were as follows: State property and undertakings 1,438.2, direct taxes 485,5, indirect taxes 1,424.2, miscellaneous taxes 244.0, charges 193.7, miscellaneous revenue 187.1. The value of State property in 1922 is estimated at 11,150.6 million marks. For National Debt see table 18 in this issue.

MUNICIPAL FINANCES. According to the Budget for 1928 expenditure amounted to 1,127.1 million marks. Income from taxation was 400.2 million marks, taxed income 5,708.2 million marks. The communal income tax (not progressive) averaged 7.0 % of the ratepayers' income.

THE BANK OF ISSUE. The Bank of Finland, (founded in 1811) is a State Bank. Its head-office is in Helsinki (Helsingfors) with branches in Turku (Åbo), Pori (Björneborg), Vaasa (Vaasa, Oulu (Uleáborg), Kuopio, Joensuu, Sortavala, Viipuri (Viborg), Mikkeli (S:t Michel), Tampere (Tammerfors), Hämeenlinna (Tavastehus), Jyväskylä and Kotka.

THE JOINT STOCK BANKS (1929): Number 19, possess 555 branch offices, where all kinds of banking business is transacted. Including all banks, there is one banking establishment per 5,800 inhabitants.

The largest banks are: Kansallis-Osake-Pankki, Ab. Nordiska Föreningsbanken, Ab. Unionbanken and Helsingfors Aktiebank, all with head offices in the capital.

OTHER BANKS (1929): Mortgage banks 7, Savings banks 474, Co-operative Credit Societies 1,419 and a Central Bank for the latter.

# FINNISH STATE FINANCES IN 1928.

#### GENERAL REVIEW.

The economic advance that marked economic life during recent years and reached its culminating point last year, had very satisfactory results for the State finances in 1928. According to the balance sheets now available the financial results for that year were better than for any of the previous three years and also appreciably more statisfactory than one could have ventured to expect at the time the Budget was drawn up.


The main features of the results are given in table I which shows the progress of revenue and expenditure during 1922—1928. The figures refer to the gross sums of revenue and expenditure.

According to this table both revenue and expenditure grew appreciably since 1927 owing partly to an increase of the actual revenue and expenditure, but in a great measure also in consequence of the conversion of loans that was carried out. The actual revenue increased by 551.3 million marks or by the same amount as in the previous year. To this it must be added that a new loan was taken up which was entered as revenue amounting to 535.0 million marks, but was balanced by considerably larger sums of redemption in the expenditure.

The expenditure also shows a considerable rise. With regard to the extraordinary expenditure this is due chiefly to the redemption just mentioned. It will be found, however, that the ordinary expenditure was also increased by 238.4 million marks, representing an increase of 7.2 %. The increase is, however, less than for the year before, when it was 11.0 %. We deal below with the question as to the items to which the increase is due.

At this point we need only remark that the cash balance of the State which had dropped in 1925, 1926 and 1927, received an addition of 30.8 million marks last year. This result, which is satisfactory in itself, should, however, not have too much importance attached to it, for an opinion as to the financial position must, naturally, depend on an examination of the nature of the revenue and expenditure.

#### EXPENDITURE.

According to the budget estimates passed by the Diet the State expenditure for 1928 was calculated at 4,233.1 million marks, of which 3,468.6 millions were ordinary and 764.5 millions extraordinary expenditure. As usual, the Diet subsequently granted both supplementary grants and grants for fresh purposes in the course of the year. Great changes were occasioned especially by the new loan, the proceeds of which were employed for special redemption of the National Debt. Thus the total amount of expenditure was 4,970.2 million marks. The actual expenditure differed only slightly from this figure, as it amounted to 5,041.6 million marks, as already stated.

The division of expenditure according to main groups is shown in table II on the next page in which the corresponding figures for 1927 are included for the sake of comparison. A comparison with the ordinary expenditure for 1927 shows that the expenditure on education, agriculture, communications, social affairs and State business enterprises increased most, while on the other hand the decrease in ordinary expenditure on the National Debt is worth noting. The latter change is counterbalanced by the large item included under this heading in the extraordinary expenditure. The great increase in the extraordinary expenditure on agriculture also deserves notice, it being partly due to grants called for by the poor harvest.

The picture of the division of expenditure under main groups which is best illustrated by the percentages in the last column of table II, is, nevertheless, rather misleading in some respects. These figures, as we mentioned before, refer to gross expenditure. As these are more than outweighed, for instance, in regard to railways, post and telegraphs and the industrial undertakings of the State, by the corresponding gross revenue, the Government has actually no expenditure, if the net figures are calculated, but derives revenue from such activities. This is seen more clearly in the calculation of the net balances to which we shall refer later on.

The greater part of the extraordinary expenditure bears the character of investment of capital and redemption of debt. Redemption last year represented an unusually large amount owing to the conversion that was carried out in

connection with the new loan. Besides the amount of 640.3 million marks of extraordinary expenditure that was employed for this purpose, an amount of 217.3 million marks is included in the ordinary expenditure in the 17th main group for the same object. As regards investment of capital, this was made partly for purposes not yielding income, such as the building of schools, hospitals etc. Those funds are, however, of more importance that were used for purposes which immediately increase the future revenue of the State. Of these the following may be mentioned in particular:

The loans were granted chiefly for improving agriculture and building national schools. — In addition to the items mentioned it should be stated that 40.0 millions were transferred to the fund for old age and sickness insurance and 33.5 millions to the grain fund.

#### REVENUE.

The actual Government revenue was estimated in the budget at 3,954.0 million marks for 1928. It proved, however, that the estimates were far too cautious, for the actual revenue according to the balance sheets amounted to 4,537.4 million marks, not including the State loan taken up. The ordinary revenue exceeded the estimates by close on 540 million marks. There were differences from the budget almost all along the line, though the most important reasons for the increase in revenue are found in the greater revenue derived from the State forests and the yield of the income and property tax, the import duties and the stamp tax. All these increases are the result of liveliness in business activity. - To this must be added the booked revenue of the loan referred to above, 535.0 million marks, so that the total revenue amounted to 5,072.4 million marks.


The proceeds of the most important categories of revenue are given in table III on the next page which also illustrates the movement in 1924-1928.

With the exception of "miscellaneous revenue" all categories show an appreciable rise from previous years. Broadly, the mutual proportion

remained of the different categories has unchanged. It should be pointed out, however, that the first category is really not comparable to other categories of revenue. The latter are actual revenue for the Government, while more than two-thirds of the former are disbursed as expenditure for obtaining this revenue. Before stating the net figures which give a more correct idea of the actual importance of the different kinds of revenue for the administration of the State, the most important items of gross revenue should be mentioned:

#### NET EXPENDITURE AND REVENUE.

As a continuation of the series of figures published in former years in this Bulletin (see

No. 6, 1928) with regard to the net revenue of the State, we give the corresponding figures for 1928 in the following. These net figures have been arrived at by subtracting from the gross revenue (loans not included) the ordinary expenses and current repairs of State business undertakings, i. e. forest exploitation, railways, canals, post and telegraphs, etc., but not expenditure incurred in acquiring new property or amounts written off capital, which latter, as a matter of fact, do not appear in State accountancy. In the case of the State railways, however, renewal grants of 51.2 millions and 56.5 millions respectively have been included for 1927 and 1928. The net expenditure of the State, according to this method, comprises the total expenditure with the exception of the part on business undertakings mentioned above and additional redemption of National Debt.

The expenditure of the business undertakings calculated on this principle amounted to over a milliard of marks. The net expenditure of the

The ordinary net expenditure displays the same rising tendency as the gross expenditure, but the rise is considerably less. The total net expenditure, calculated per head of population, again rose appreciably in 1928.

It should be unnecessary to give a review of the distribution of the net expenditure, as in regard to most of the main groups this would

be a repetition of figures already quoted. Τt need only be mentioned that of the total net budget 18.2 % referred to expenditure on defence, including non-recurring expenditure, 17.3 % to education and 14.3 % to the National The latter figure includes, as already Debt. stated, considerable redemption of the Debt. The extraordinary redemption has to be added, which alone is equivalent to 20.7 % of the net ex-Interest alone, including, however, penditure. a proportionate part of the agio account, did not amount to more than 7.3 % of the net expenditure.

The net revenue is of greater interest. Its amount and distribution according to the most important categories are given in table V above.

The revenue in each category shows an increase from year to year. The increase was smallest in the third group of revenue, while the rise in the net revenue was largest, relatively, from the business undertakings of the State. The distribution of this latter revenue according to its sources will be found in greater detail in table VI below.

In studying the figures in table VI two things must be taken into consideration. In the first place, the figures are based on the Government's cameral accountancy and therefore do not inhow the remunerativeness of the dicate. various branches would turn out according to correct business principles. In the second place, it must not be lost sight of that some of these branches of enterprise are not carried on by any means chiefly with the idea of earning revenue for the State, but for achieving certain public purposes.

As this table shows, it is only the State forests and the State railways that are of any great financial importance for the State. They brought in together 78.3 % last year of all revenue in this category. The yield of both these sources increased appreciably from 1927, which must be ascribed to the unusually lively economic activity ruling last year. The revenue derived from the post and telegraphs and the sale of spirits is also not unimportant, but the yield from both sources was reduced, the latter very considerably. Other business enterprises do not produce any It should, however, be pointed great income. out that the Outokumpu copper mine was only worked for part of the year and that some fairly important business enterprises in which the State has invested capital during recent years, have not yet started their activity.

Taxes are, of course, of greater importance for the State finances than the business enterprises of the State. Their division into direct, indirect and miscellaneous taxes during recent years will be found in table VII above.


In the first group the income and property tax was alone of importance: its yield last year amounted to 562.9 million marks. Among the indirect taxes the import duties are decidedly the most important, but besides these excise in particular is worth attention. The yield of the various indirect taxes is seen in the following table VIII.

While the yield of the export duties has as falling tendency, the yield of the import duties and all excise increased considerably. The import duties, which alone yielded 85.7 % of all indirect taxes, are made up to a preponderating degree of fiscal duties, although some protective duties are also of importance from a fiscal point of view. The following table gives an idea of the distribution of duties according to the most important articles of consumption:

Since the beginning of 1928 lower rates of duty were applied with regard, for instance, to wheat, coffee and sugar. The yield was made good, however, by the larger quantities imported; in the case of wheat the total yield was even increased in spite of the reduction of duty. The appreciable imports of rye caused by last year's poor harvest, are apparent in the greater revenue from "other cereals". The considerable increase in imports of textiles, metals, motor vehicles, petrol etc., caused an increase of customs revenue from "other commodities".

#### THE NATIONAL DEBT.

The considerable changes that occurred in the National Debt in 1928 have already been referred to. It need only be mentioned here that the new loan which amounted to a nominal sum of 15 million dollars, bears a nominal rate of interest of 5  $\frac{1}{2}$  % and is consequently considerably more favourable than the former foreign loans of the State.

The total National Debt, which amounted to 3,627.3 million marks at the beginning of the year, had dropped by the end of the year to 3,470.4 million marks.<sup>1</sup>) The reduction was thus 156.9 million marks, which is equivalent to 4.3 % of the former amount. The movement is illustrated by the diagram above. Per head of population the National Debt, which is

entirely funded, represented about 1,034 marks at the end of 1928.

#### CONCLUSION.

The above remarks show that the State revenue exceeded the expenditure in 1928 by 30.8 million marks; that the expenditure includes redemption to an amount of 322.0 million marks more than the proceeds of the loan; and that 413.9 million marks were invested in such a way that they will increase State revenue. This is sufficient to show, how satisfactory the last Government balance sheets actually were.

It has already been pointed out that last year's lively economic activity has a large. though not a decisive share in this satisfactory result. The change in the position which set in last summer and autumn, had not had time to influence last year's State finances. It must, however, be anticipated that revenue from several sources will come in on a smaller scale this year, while in regard to the income and property tax, for instance, the change will become apparent only next year. It should also be noted that some reductions of taxation are demanded by circumstances, particularly in regard to large companies. But even though temporary difficulties may arise, we can, in view of the sound position of the State finances. look into the future with confidence.

# ITEMS.

Imatra Power Station. In the last days of May the new power station at the Imatra rapids, owned by the State, was officially opened. An article in a later issue will deal with the building of the power station, its cost, purpose and future plans. Here it need only be mentioned that the opening ceremony was celebrated in the presence of the President of the Republic and a number of guests. It should be stated as an interesting occurrence that the old bed of the rapids was laid bare for several minutes before the eyes of the spectators, though the power station does not in general affect the natural beauty of the rapids or their power. - Mr Hugo Malmi is the director-in-chief of the power station and has guided the whole work of construction.

700 years' celebrations and fair. As 700 years have gone by since the Pope in 1229 granted permission for the Turku (Åbo) cathedral to be transferred to its present site, the town, the traditions of which as a trading centre go much further back, celebrated its own and its cathedral's 700 years' jubilee in June, which took place with great solemnity in this ancient centre of culture.

In conjunction with this a general fair had been arranged, its special object, in view of the economic position, being to give the home industries an opportunity of showing what they were capable of. The local agricultural machinery branch predominates at the fair, but other branches of production are also well represented.

S. O. K.'s 25 years' jubilee. In the middle of June the larger of the two Finnish central organisations of the consumers' co-operative

movement, the Finnish Co-operative Wholesale Society (commonly called S. O. K.) celebrated its 25 years' jubilee. This central co-operative organisation can look back upon a rapid development. At the end of 1928 it had 419 members (consumers' co-operative societies) with 8,172 shares.' Its own funds amounted to 93.2 million marks and its total sales in 1928 reached the figure of 1,003.4 million marks. During the latter part of its progress S. O. K. has established a considerable number of productive enterprises. Among these may be mentioned a hosiery factory, chemical works and a machine shop in Helsinki (Helsingfors). At Vaajakoski near Jyväskylä a sawmill has also been built with some woodworking establishments, a margarine factory, a sweetstuff factory and a jam factory. There is also a brickworks at Jämsä and a bakery and macaroni factory in Viipuri (Viborg). The sales from the society's own productive concerns have increased greatly year by year and amounted altogether to 80.0 million marks for 1928, thus providing a surplus of 5.2 million marks.

New bond loans. Two small bond loans have recently been raised abroad. One was taken up by Hypoteksföreningen i Finland (the Mortgage Society of Finland) through a consortium consisting of the Bank of Finland and Stockholms Enskilda Bank. The loan is for 10 million Swedish crowns, the principal part of which was placed in Sweden, and bears interest at  $6 \frac{1}{2} %$ for 30 years. Further, the City of Turku (Abo) took up a bond loan of £ 500,000 through Hambros Bank Ltd. and Stockholms Enskilda Bank. The nominal rate of interest is  $6 \frac{1}{2} %$  and the term of redemption is 30 years. 30

Maakuntain Pankki Oy. At the beginning of June the constituent meeting of shareholders of the bank Maakuntain Pankki Oy. was held. As mentioned before, this bank was formed by the amalgamation of three medium-sized banks, Länsi-Suomen Osake-Pankki, Tampereen Osake-Pankki and Maakuntain Keskus-Pankki Osakeyhtiö which now cease to exist as separate banking establishments. For a couple of months these banks have already published an unofficial combined statement of the monthly balance sheets of the three banks. This shows that the new bank has a share capital of 125 million marks, reserve funds amounting to 65.8 millions and a total balance sheet of 1,300 million marks. In regard to its balance sheet total the new bank is therefore the third in order of the Finnish Joint Stock banks. Mr E. Tulenheimo, hitherto the managing director of Tampereen Osake-Pankki, is the director-in-chief of the new bank.

**Building operations.** Building operations which had been on the increase for some years, were unusually lively last year, but have fallen off since owing to the stringency of the money market. The movement is illustrated by the following figures which refer to the capital with its population of over 200,000 inhabitants.

During January—May this year the number of completed dwellings was 2,603 with 5,940 rooms which differs little from the corresponding figure for the same period last year. The reason is that building can only be reduced slowly, because the buildings under construction have to be completed. The number of new undertakings has, however, fallen off greatly now, as is seen from the fact that at the end of last May the laying of foundations was being carried out for only 27 houses as against 86 a year ago. The number of plans passed has also gone down considerably.

New steamer. The Finland Steamship Company's new steamer "Ilmatar" was recently added to the merchant fleet of Finland. The ship is 283 feet long, 41.6 feet beam and draws 18 feet. It is 2,365 gross reg. tons and 1,208 net. Its speed is 14 ½—15 knots and its engines develop 2,500 effective HP. The ship is built according to the A1 class at Lloyds and is ice strengthened far in excess of Lloyds' requirements. The "Ilmatar" carries 90 first-class and 60 third-class passengers. The new steamer has been laid on the Helsinki (Helsingfors) — Lübeck line.

Tourist traffic. According to figures recently published Finland was visited last year by 32,670 foreigners compared with 30,163 in 1927. Of this number about 3,200 were so-called American Finns who were visiting their mother country. According to approximate estimates these tourists provided a revenue to this country of about 175 million marks or 15 millions more than in 1927. The number of Finns who travelled abroad during 1928 was 29,733 compared with 28,048 in the previous year. Their expenditure is estimated at about 178 million marks.

Crop prospects. The cold and rainy weather in May was rather unfavourable for the crops, whereas the warmer and better weather conditions in the beginning of June promoted the growth. The first growth of rye has on the whole stood the winter well and gives generally good prospects. The spring sowings were delayed in the whole country, as the fields owing to the rainy weather were too wet; the sowing began for the most part during the latter half of May. The new crops are partly uneven but nevertheless on the whole rather satisfactory. The planting of potatoes and vegetables only occurred during the last days of May and in the beginning of June, it being, thus, too early to report anything in regard to them. In the middle of June the crop prospects could be described as medium for all cultivated plants. A general idea can be gleaned from the following table in which, in stating the crop prospects, a scale of figures is employed, 8 signifying very good, 7 good, 6 above medium, 5 medium, 4 below medium, 3 poor crop, 2 almost a failure of crop, and 1 a failure of crop.
